

Maui Delegates Refuse To "Deal"

mitted that something was up but that he was helpless in the matter.

"I then got hold of Kubio who declared that if Wise had made promises that they would be kept. And later I hunted up John Wise. He like Shingle, admitted that he would not be able to make good on his promises. Said that while he had been away on the mainland Lorrin Andrews and Arthur Brown had been busy and fixed things in such shape that he was powerless.

"They wanted me to take the chairmanship of the executive committee of the central committee with Andrews or Wise as vice-chairman. Now, there are 10 members of the executive committee including the chairman. The 4th and 5th districts of Oahu together have 4, and because of the indifference of the Honolulu business men and so-called good-government element in not attending their primaries, the spoils gang absolutely controlled these. They also had control of the two delegates from Hawaii, thus giving them 6 of the 10. Maui has 2 places on the committee and Kauai 1, and these would have been with us.

"I tried to get Al Castle agreed to for vice-chairman, but they wouldn't have him at all. Finally I suggested Alex Robertson, but they turned down Robertson too. They would have liked me to have taken the chairmanship with the vice-chairman of their own naming for they would have expected to have my support in a financial way and at the same time have us tied hand and foot and helpless. It was also absolutely necessary for me to have the naming of the vice-chairman for the reason that by reason of my not living in Honolulu much of the actual executive work would have fallen upon him.

"As for Andrews or Wise, neither of them was possible. I haven't spoken to Andrews for about 6 years."

A TNT Shell Exploded

It was following this deadlock that the delegations began turning in their slates for members of the central committee, that the Maui delegation withdrew for a caucus and every man declined to accept a place on the body. Sam Kalama, George Cooke, and one or two others at first thought that Maui must not bolt the convention and must go through the formalities, but neither Sam nor Cooke would for a minute consider taking the job themselves, and it ended by Kalama's announcing on the floor of the convention that Maui would submit no names for the committee. Maui's share on the central committee is 6 out of the 30 members.

The announcement is said to have been a bomb-shell in the convention. It evidently jarred the Oahu ringsters into a daze and that was the condition they were still in when the Maui delegates left to catch the boat for home.

Baldwin's Hunch

Senator Baldwin has the game of the ring leaders doped out to his own satisfaction. He says:

"Kubio wants another term as delegate. I think his explanation of wishing to round out a full 20 years as Hawaii's representative in congress is probably correct. A short while back he came out with endorsement of McCarthy for reappointment as governor—and the Honolulu papers commended him for it. But after this next term he will be open for the governorship and in framing things to be recommended for this by the territorial committee. Shingle sees the delegateship open for himself. Wise expects to be secretary of the territory at the same time through the central committee's endorsement; while Andrews and Brown plan, through control of the committee, to dictate the judicial appointments to be made."

Baldwin says he may have put himself out of politics for all time by his actions. If so, he says, he doesn't care. He intimates rather strongly that Kubio is in for rough sledding in his campaign this fall. He points out that if it had not been for the Honolulu business element that rallied to his rescue McCandless would have defeated him the last time he ran.

No conference will be sanctioned unless the Bolshevik reverse their attitude and agree to discuss peace with Poland and all qualified representatives of the Russian border states are permitted to attend.

PLAN REDUCTION OF ALLIED OBLIGATIONS

WASHINGTON, July 28—Reduction of the allied debt to the United States by the applications to the debts of the various governments of amounts awarded them on claims against the United States, growing out of the war, is being considered by the treasury department.

Senator Rice States Maui's Definite Stand

The following statement has been prepared by Senator H. W. Rice, a delegate from Maui to Monday's convention. It is understood that it was read and concurred in by Senator Baldwin:

The Republican Convention met on Monday, July 26th, at 10 A. M., for the purpose of drawing up a Territorial platform and selecting a Central Committee from which an Executive Committee should be chosen to organize and carry on business of the Republican Party here in the Territory.

"It was apparent to the Maui delegates, when they reached Honolulu Sunday morning, that John Wise, Lorrin Andrews, Arthur Brown, and other scheming politicians were aiming to control the Executive Committee if possible. Maui immediately realized that they had been lying on the word of men who were willing to break their promises as soon as the exigency arose. At the convention in May, Maui did not contest R. W. Shingle's wishes to be National Committeeman, but for the sake of harmony supported him in turn Mr. Shingle and his friends would aid in giving Maui the Chairmanship of the Executive Committee, and a fair share of members with whom Maui could work.

"Mr. Shingle who owed his position as National Committeeman to the good will of the Maui delegation did not even attend the Convention held Monday, and John Wise contended that as he was now under obligations to Lorrin Andrews, he must now support Andrews and his crowd.

"After permanent officers had been named by the Convention and the report of the Rules Committee and the platform of the Platform Committee had been adopted the Convention took a recess so that the different delegates could caucus by districts and elect their central Committeeman. In the fourth district where Andrews, Brown and Wise belong, Maui delegates had seen a slate made up for this district which apparently carried easily much to disgust of the minority.

"In the fifth district where many good men were present Mr. Jack Atkinson nominated a slate that had been prepared by leaders of the gang in the fourth. This slate carried, defeating such men as Mr. Wooley, William Henry and Alfred Castle. It was certainly a disgrace that the fifth should have been led by the fourth district gang.

"When Maui realized what material Oahu had presented for an

Executive Committee, there was not a man there from Maui who would allow his name to be put up as a member of the Central Committee. As members of the Counties outside of Honolulu on the Executive Committee must leave their proxies with the town members of the Committee in order that the business of the Party might be more expeditiously carried out.

"Would the citizens of Maui wish their delegates to take the responsibility of lending their good names to a Committee whose Chairman is only a Republican of skin thickness, as was shown by the last Legislature? A man who ignored the names of good Republicans for his Committeeman at the last legislature and took on as clerk a Democrat and an ex-convict? Look over the membership as printed in the Honolulu papers of the Executive Committee from the fourth and the fifth and see if there is any citizen
