

Candidates Plenty In Kohala—W. P. McDougall, manager of the Kohala Club & Transportation Co., has announced his intention of running for the territorial senate on the democratic ticket. S. P. Wood, it is also believed will be a democratic candidate. Senator Robert Hind, Representative H. L. Kawewehi and T. K. Nahiwa have declared their intention to run on the republican ticket from the same district.

Traffic Increase At Honolulu—Harbormaster Foster, in a preliminary estimate, shows that one-eighth more steamers called in Honolulu during the year ending June 30 than during the previous 12 months. Local steamers entering and leaving this port increased in numbers during the year by about 750. There was an increase in steam tonnage of 165,000 tons, but in sailing vessels a decrease of tonnage is shown.

Filipino Convict Is Finally Rounded Up
Committed 6 Burglaries While At Large Including Home Of Postmaster Lloyd In Lahaina—Two Watches Recovered

After committing at least 6 burglaries in a little more than a week's time, Eduardo Galacia, the Filipino convict who escaped from the prison camp at Kahului, a week ago last Sunday night, was caught by Police Officer H. Enos, on the sandhills, just below the Wailuku depot, last Monday afternoon. He confessed to the various burglaries, most of which occurred at Lahaina, and a part of the property he had stolen was recovered.

Among the places burglarized by Galacia was the home of Arthur Lloyd postmaster at Lahaina, from whose home he took a gold watch and about \$60 in cash. The watch was found in his possession but the money had gone in automobile rides and gambling.

After eluding the guards at the Kahului compound, Galacia immediately entered a Japanese house in Kahului where he stole a suit of clothes and about \$15 in cash. Thus equipped he had no trouble in getting over to Lahaina where in the next few days he entered 4 or 5 other houses, including that of Lloyd's. He took a watch from a Japanese home and another suit of clothes which fitted him better than those he stole at Kahului, hiding the latter in a cane field. He is known to have entered a number of other houses in which he was unable to find anything of value.

He came back to central Maui and was recognized at Puunene, but had left before his identity was fully established. At Paia he was cleaned out of his money in a gambling game, and tried to raise some money on one of the watches he had stolen. A policeman suspected him and would have arrested him, but for the assurance of a Korean of Paia that the man was a resident of the community.

The man was identified by Policeman Enos from a photograph sent up from Honolulu, though the likeness was a poor one. After his arrest, however, the man confessed and gave the details of his wanderings. Galacia was serving a sentence for a burglary committed on Oahu and was recently sent here to work on the Kahului fair grounds.

Kentucky Herefords May Come To Maui County Fair

Word was received this week from Giltner Bros., the prominent firm of Hereford breeders, of Kentucky, that the greatest shipment of blooded cattle that ever left their farms is now on the way to the Islands in charge of H. L. Low, who is already well known among livestock men of the territory. There are 19 registered Herefords and 16 registered Holsteins in the bunch.

While none of these cattle have been sold to Maui breeders, all having been engaged by Hawaii and Kauni stockmen, Mr. Low expects to be on Maui and it is possible that he will arrange to bring a number of the cattle with him for exhibition at the Maui County Fair in October.
