Transport Passes Helpless Annie E.

Capt. Piltz And Two Boys Finally Rescued After Drifting More Than Week—Schooner May Be Saved.

HONOLULU, August 18 — After drifting waterlogged and helpless for more than a week, the schooner Annie E. was located by the government lighthouse tender Kukui some 150 miles west of Kauai, and Capt. Emil E. Piltz, William Leithead, and another boy, who were aboard the vessel, were rescued. The schooner was towed to Kauai where it is probable that she can be saved together with her cargo of lumber.

The Annie E. sailed from Honolulu on Sunday, August 8, with lumber for Mahukona. She began leaking shortly after she left port, and finally the pumps were unable to cope with the flow and the vessel became helpless. Capt. Piltz sent three Portuguese sailors of the crew in a small boat in hope that they would be able to make land and send aid. This boat was picked up by a Japanese fishing sloop and taken to Honolulu.

Various craft and a number of airplanes were dispatched to search for the schooner, but without avail.

Transport Refuses Aid

Then the army transport Madawaska, which left here Sunday last for the orient, reported by wireless that she had seen flares from some vessel on Sunday night off Kauai, but had not stopped to investigate. Later, on specific request the master of the steamer gave the location of his ship at the time the flares were seen as latitude 29.17 north and longitude 160.42 west. Acting upon this data the Kukui again took up the search and located the disabled schooner approximately 90 miles west of the position given by the Madawaska's skipper.

The master of the transport, Capt. Johnson, formerly captain of the transport Sherman, is being severely criticized for his failure to offer succor to the Annie E.'s crew in their desperate plight.

ON THE OTHER ISLANDS

Prince Of Wales To Be Here September 1—Authentic advices state that the Prince of Wales, on board the British battleship Renown, will land at Kealahou, Hawaii, on August 30, for a visit to the Volcano Kilauea. He is expected to return to the ship and sail from the Big Island so that he will arrive in Honolulu the following day.

Jump Fares 20 Per Cent—Representatives of six leading steamship lines of the Orient, in conference at Yokohama, have decided to increase passenger rates of the first and second classes 20 per cent, to become effective September 1, according to a dispatch from Tokio to the Nippu Jiji.

Wise Seeks McClellan's Job—Senator J. H. Wise announces that he is in the field for appointment as special Washington representative for the Honolulu chamber of commerce. Wise denies he was seeking election as secretary of the territory or appointment as executive officer of the Hawaiian homes commission under the pending rehabilitation bill.

Smoot Here On Mormon Business—Bishop C. W. Nibley, of the Mormon Church at Salt Lake City, arrived on the Matsonia, in company with Senator Reed Smoot, to remain here a week. They came on business connected with the Mormon mission.
