

MAUI TWENTY YEARS AGO

(From Maui News, August 18, 1900)

Mr. and Mrs. Hagencamp of Kauhakakai are the guests of Mrs. E. K. Vander Naillen at her residence at Spreckelsville.

Mr. Will Dickey, wife and family and Mr. Fred Waterhouse, wife and family came over on the Mauna Loa and spent Tuesday night at the Windsor, leaving the next morning for Mr. C. H. Dickey's home at Haiku.

Inside of the next three months there will be a new steam tug in use at Kahului, the plans for which have already been prepared. The three and a half to five feet draught, with a fifty horsepower engine, electric lights, a search light and forward and aft water compartments by which the draught of the tug can be regulated. The tug will be used to handle lighters, tow vessels and for other general purposes.

Russia occupies a unique and masterful position on the Chinese checkerboard at present and it is a safe guess that when the contented cats have raked the chestnuts out of the fire, the monkey chessky will be found to have a mouthful of seaports.

Mr. H. B. Hall, one of the United States postal inspectors sent down to the Islands to inaugurate the new postal system, spent this week on Maui and visited all the postoffices on the Island. In most of them he found things running smoothly and compliments the postmasters, having but one inefficient one in the lot.

The postoffice at Wailuku is doing a business which will raise it to the grade of a third class or "presidential" office on the 1st of July 1901.

A portion of the crew of the Bangalore, consists of Japanese, two of whom have escaped from the vessel.

The other night one of the mates heard a great jabbering in Japanese under his window and on looking out of the porthole he saw two other Japs struggling in the water. It seems they had stolen and lunched a coal shoot and put their effects on board of it with the intention of paddling it ashore, but it upset spilling their stuff in the water. The mate yelled to them and rushed on deck but they were ahead of him and when he went to their bunks, they were lying in them, wringing wet, but apparently sound asleep. There have been further attempts on their part to escape.

ON THE OTHER ISLANDS

"Dad" Center Made Coach—"Dad" Center has been appointed head coach and trainer for the American swimming team according to a dispatch received from Bill Harris in Antwerp.

Five Battleships Coming—The commandant of Pearl Harbor has been advised that five capital ships of the navy will visit Hawaii early in September. Ships named in the advice are the New York, New Mexico, Arkansas, Idaho and Wyoming. Admiral Rodman is expected to be aboard the New Mexico, his flag ship.

Many Births Unregistered—The board of health has been notified that because only 80 per cent of the births in Hawaii are registered the territory is not included in the federal birth

registration area which requires ninety per cent for admission.

Riley Allen Given Advance—Judge E. M. Watson, who has just returned from San Francisco reports that Riley Allen, formerly editor of the Star-Bulletin, and who is now taking Russian children from Vladivostok to Petrograd via the United States, has been promoted from major to lieutenant-colonel of the Red Cross, and is lined either for a higher position in the Red Cross or in the state department.

Roll Victim Down Hill—Lured from his stand, held up, robbed, then stripped of his clothing, gagged, bound and rolled down the slopes of Round-top hill, back of Honolulu, was the experience of K. Fujita, a Japanese chauffeur, who was discovered in an injured condition and brought to the city.

Trust Companies To Unite—It is reported that the Bishop and the Guardian Trust companies, not including the Bishop Insurance agency, will be amalgamated October 1.

ORDINANCE NO. 53

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ORDINANCE NO. 31 RELATING TO THE REGISTRATION, USE AND OPERATION OF MOTOR CARS, AND THE EXAMINATIONS AND QUALIFICATIONS OF CHAUFFEURS AND DRIVERS THEREOF, AND CREATING AN OFFICE TO BE KNOWN AS THE EXAMINER OF CHAUFFEURS AND INSPECTOR OF AUTOMOBILES FOR THE COUNTY OF MAUI; AND BY AMENDING SECTION 12, THEREOF.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS IN AND FOR THE COUNTY OF MAUI, TERRITORY OF HAWAII, That,

SECTION 1. Section 12 of Ordinance No. 31 as amended by Ordinances No. 34 and 42, is hereby amended to read as follows, to-wit:

"No motor car shall be operated upon any public highway in the County of Maui at a rate of speed exceeding fifteen miles per hour. Provided, however, that when one-half mile from the Court House at Lahaina on the Wailuku-Lahaina Road and one mile and a half from the Court House on the Lahaina-Kaanapali road and outside of a radius of half a mile from the corner of Main and Market streets at Wailuku, quarter of a mile from the Kahului Railroad Company's Depot, at Kahului, and when beyond a quarter of a mile east and west and a mile and a half south of the junction of the Kahului-Kaunapali and Paia-Makawao roads at Paia, and except when between the plant of the Maui Soda and Ice Works and the Power House of the Island Electric Company at Makawela, and on the Paia Road between Maalaea Bay and Ukumehame, and when beyond one hundred yards of any school house in the County of Maui, and when beyond one hundred yards of the office of the Olowalu plantation at Olowalu and beyond two hundred yards of the Pauwela Post Office at Pauwela, such cars may be operated at a rate of speed not exceeding thirty miles per hour.

SECTION 2. This Ordinance shall become effective from and after the 15 day of August, 1920, and after a true copy thereof has been posted upon the bulletin board in front of or near the rooms occupied by the Board of Supervisors for the County of Maui, and after the publication of a true copy thereof in one issue of the Maui News and Wailuku Times, newspapers of general circulation in the County of Maui, Territory of Hawaii.
