Board Meets Tuesday.—Maui Industrial Accident board will hold its regular monthly meeting on Tuesday next.

Trial Term Monday.—Trial jurors have been summoned to attend the circuit court Monday when a trial term of the court will open.

Supervisors Meet Tomorrow.—An adjourned meeting of the board of supervisors will be held tomorrow, adjournment having been taken late Wednesday afternoon until that time.

New Garage Building.—A new two-story building which will be occupied by a garage of the ground floor and living rooms above is being erected on Market street just south of Main.

Much Smoke, Little Blaze.—Fire which was discovered under the floor of the county garage created some excitement Saturday morning. It was quickly extinguished and little damage occasioned.

Park Commissioners Recommended.—George Webb and D. T. Fleming have been recommended by the Lahaina park commissioners to fill vacancies on the board. Action was taken on the recommendation until the supervisors reconvene tomorrow.

Japanese Child Drowns.—Little Hansuo Oda strayed away from her parents' home in Puunene Sunday afternoon. When search was made the body was found in an overflow ditch not far from the house. Lift was extinct.

Goods Are Missing.—While the proprietors of the Boston Store safe in the Orpheum were at lunch Monday some one entered the building and made away with some boys' caps and other goods. Boys are suspected of the theft.

Appropriation Asked.—Circuit Judge Burr has asked the supervisors for an appropriation to meet expenses of the coming term of court. The matter was referred to the county attorney and county auditor and action will be taken by the board tomorrow.

Carpenters Are Scarce.—E. C. Mellor, who has the contract for the building of additions to Malulani Hospital has asked permission to use non-citizen carpenters until such time as he can secure citizen workers. His request was referred to the county attorney.

Team Wagon Lost.—Telephone reports from Hana tell of the loss of a team and wagon. The outfit was employed in hauling wood, went over a high bank into a swollen stream and was swept away. The driver leaped to the side away from the bank and saved himself.

Buys Revere Car.—The big, powerful, yellow bodied Re-Verre Car which attracted much attention at the Third Maui Fair where it was displayed by the Maui Garage & Transportation Company, will remain on Maui. It has been purchased and now is being driven by Dr. A. C. Rothrock.

New Residence Tract.—Notice has been given by E. R. Bevins and D. T. Fleming to the County that they have purchased land below Wailuku on which refuse has been dumped in the past and asking that a new dump site be selected and used. The notice says the property will be used for a new residential district.

Loss of Daughter.—Sympathy is the friends of H. Sylvia, postmaster at Kahului, and Mrs. Sylvia, has gone forth to them at the death of their little daughter Juliette, aged four years, who died rather suddenly Tuesday night. Funeral services were held Wednesday and interment was in the Catholic cemetery.

Red Cross Membership.—This is membership day for the American Red Cross and generally on Maui memberships are being solicited. In Wailuku tables where subscriptions for membership may be left will be found in the post office, Maui Hardware store and Maui Drug store until 5 o'clock this afternoon.

Will Trim Trees.—Permission was given J. C. Blair of the Electric Company by the supervisors to do necessary tree trimming with cooperation of county forces but he was advised to see the committee of the Woman's Club relative to the work he says is necessary with the coming of the rainy season.

Action Deferred.—Two resolutions passed by the Civic Convention were before the board of supervisors Wednesday. One referred to territorial and federal aid in building roads to Kilauea, up Haleakala and to Waimea Canyon and the other to enforcement of the national prohibition laws. They will be further considered tomorrow.

Auto Club Suggests.—Suggestion that traffic officers assist in keeping streets and roads free from glass and obstructions, as to width of roads and that reconstruction of the pall road between Wailuku and Lahaina is the most important of prospective road improvements are included in recommendations made by the Automobile Club to the board of supervisors.

Armistice Sunday.—President Wilson has designated Sunday, November 14, as "Armistice Sunday." An executive order has been issued calling for the display at half mast of all flags at military posts, naval stations, on vessels and all buildings belonging to the United States, in memory of the men who gave their lives in the World War.

Eleven Indictments Found by Grand Jury

Two of the eleven indictments which were handed down by the grand jury Wednesday afternoon are against Ned Nicholas and two other indictments are for manslaughter charges resulting from deaths occasioned where persons were run down by automobiles. The first indictment against Nicholas is for manslaughter and the second for failure to stop and render aid to a person run down and injured by his car.

Some surprise was expressed that indictments were returned against Miss Fanny G. Bradford because of the death of Yoneka Ooka, run down by the defendant during fair week and of Polito Perez for the death of Masajiro Hayashi.

The persons indicted with the charges made against them are: Ned Nicholas, manslaughter; Francisco Negroni, statutory rape; Masa Okamura, malicious conversation; Joe Joseph, first degree burglary; Florentina Ledesma, assault with deadly weapon; Fernando Marcella, highway robbery; Atong Akiona, second degree larceny; Fanny G. Bradford, manslaughter; Ned Nicholas, failure to render needed assistance to a person struck by his automobile.

The specific charge against Masa Okamura is the taking of an automobile belonging to Ralph Wilson. Okamura was one of the prisoners who escaped from the Wailuku jail in September and it is charged he took Wilson's automobile and drove it to Lahaina where he was taken by officers of the sheriff.

Three Years Old Child Is Drowned in Ditch

Three year old Ah Lin was drowned in the Spreckels ditch Monday and her body found in the plantation reservoir Wednesday afternoon. The drowned child was Hawaiian-Chinese, her mother being Hawaiian and now married to a Filipino.

The mother told the police that she was out with the child and when she stopped to talk to another woman the little one started toward the ditch. She called to it to return and resumed her conversation. Then she went across to a store and said the child was not out of her sight for ten minutes. Alarmed when she could not find her daughter she raised an alarm.

The ditch was running more than usually full by reason of the rains Sunday night and Monday morning.
