Athletic Committee Prepares For Work

Body in Charge of Maui Sports Reorganizes and Names Committee to Outline Tentative Program.

Organization of the Athletic Committee of the Maui County Fair and Racing Association for the year was effected at a meeting held in the Chamber of Commerce rooms on Monday evening. The committee will act as sponsor for all island sports on a similar basis to the A. A. U., in other parts of the country.

J. Garcia, who had acted so satisfactorily as chairman of the committee last year was reappointed chairman at the recent meeting of the parent organization, the Fair and Racing Association. He has named nearly all the members of the last year committee to serve with him. At the Monday meeting there were present besides the chairman Messrs. Fantom, Bowker, Hughes, Childs, Cummings, Paschoal, Meinecke, Collins and Puck.

In organization George H. Cummings was retained as vice-chairman and C. A. Puck, secretary. Committee heads, to name the personnel of their own committees and responsible to the Athletic Committee are as follows: M. G. Paschoal, senior baseball; George H. Cummings, junior baseball; Clem Crowell, tug-of-war; C. A. Puck, track events and baseball; J. T. Fantom, bicycle races; R. E. Hughes, swimming and boating; Joseph Meinecke, entertainment; A. W. Collins, advisory and tennis; C. L. Bowker, boxing and wrestling. Seabury Short reported his inability to serve on the committee as he purposes going to the mainland.

Next came a clear understanding of the province of the main committee to foster, encourage and uplift sports and of the sub-committees to report back to the main committee their plans and activities for endorsement and support.

A new departure is the rules and suggestions committee composed of Messrs Puck, Childs and Bowker. It will prepare rules and by-laws for the governing of the Athletic committee and will submit to the next meeting of the committee a general tentative program covering the activities in sports for the year.

Los Angeles Team Will Not Play Game on Maui; Expenses Found Too High

Maui will not accept the offer for a visit from the Los Angeles Blues basketball team. The cost is greater than could be defrayed by receipts from a game in any building that is available for the purpose.

At the meeting of the Athletic Committee of the Fair and Racing Association there was read a letter from P. H. Nottage of Honolulu in reference to a visit from and a game with the Los Angeles basketball team. A guaranty of \$500 and "entertainment" was asked. The letter of reply of Chairman Garcia explaining lack of a suitable place for the game was also read and the meeting endorsed the views expressed in his letter and declined the offer.

Maui will be represented by a basketball team and by a soccer team in the Inter-Island championship series. Selection of the basketball team is now in process through a series of elimination of candidates games. A soccer team to compete for the Harrison cup is also to be chosen but recent wet weather has delayed start in the soccer program.

One proposal as to soccer to which no reply has yet been received is that the Hilo team stop in Maui for a championship game, the winner to go on to Honolulu and there meet the winner of a match between Honolulu and Kaula. In that way expense could be saved either to Maui or Hilo as the result of the game determined.
