**Thirty Day Session Quite Long Enough, View of Governor**

Recommendation that the legislature complete its session within 30 days was made by Governor McCarthy in his message to the legislature which was read to both houses on the opening day when he said: "I wish to tell you again that I believe this is the best Legislature that the Territory has had. Your efficiency was shown by the expeditious manner in which you handled the important matters placed before you at the special session last November. Your work in that session has earned for you a reputation which will be difficult for future legislatures to equal."  
"You now have a chance to better even this reputation by completing the work of this session in thirty days. I know that you can do it if you will. I hope that you will. Any assistance which the executive departments can give will be given gladly."  
The governor's message is in pamphlet form and contains 24 pages. He deals with the financial outlook and says it is vitally necessary that a method be provided whereby the territory's income be increased, after referring to the fact that federal income taxes may now be deducted from corporation's returns.  
Proceeding with the public debt the message treats of the budget, the appropriation bill, wharf and harbor improvements he reaches schools. There he reviews the past year and its progress to let you know about our Boy Scouts.  
I am doing my duty to God and my country. I am helping the people.  
I will also tell you about our school garden. In it we planted egg plants, lettuce, tomatoes, cabbages, beets, Irish potatoes, beans, cucumbers, turnips, and Japanese radishes. We are taking good care of our garden so we can win the first prize.

**Foresters Make Early Start For Convention**

Big Island Foresters have started preparations for the annual convention of the order which will be held in Hilo next July. Well in advance to avoid hurry and rush and to insure satisfactory arrangements for the handling of the big crowd that is expected, at a meeting of the executive committee held last Friday the following committees were announced:  
Transportation, housing and automobiles, Henry K. Kapea; luau and maintenance, M. I. Cabral; initiation, Manuel de Coito; athletics, T. E. M. Osorio; parade, William H. Beers; concessions, George Tucker; reception and show, Bert Schoen; entertainment, Paul K. Tallett; publicity, E. S. Capellas; construction, J. S. Rickard; pennant and decorations, T. E. M. Osorio and George Tucker; refreshment, Ezekiel Vieira. Sub-committees will be selected whenever the necessity arises.  
**Cost of Natatorium**—It is estimated that the cost of the proposed memorial natatorium in Honolulu in the memorial park will be 20 cents on each \$1000 of assessed valuation.

The bill makes 11 recommendations among which are included extension and improvement of industrial and manual training with an appropriation of \$75,000, supplementary reading in the elementary grades with \$30,000 appropriation, traveling expenses for supervising principals and industrial supervisors and increase in staff and salaries of the department office. He favors a revolving school fund such as he recommended to the special session.  
Among other recommendations are for a court of domestic relations, deputy sugar expert for each island, enabling of women to hold office and for county libraries.

**Ethel Clayton**  
Ethel Clayton is playing in the most thrilling, most unusual picture in many moons, and in the big scene she wears a gown made of beads, or something, that fairly out-Shebas Sheba. The picture is "Sins of Rosanne," and Miss Clayton is costumed to represent the famous queen at a lawn fete held in Kimberley, near the famous diamond mines. Up to this time, according to the story, she has been playing the role of a sort of feminine Jekyll and Hyde—outwardly the pretty but otherwise quite ordinary daughter of an English widow, but inwardly torn with a mad craving for bright stones which she received from a native Malay witch doctor when she was an infant.  
The result is a story of thrills, mystery and in the end love. The plot is novel, but Miss Clayton's earnest interpretation of the fascinating heroine makes her strange experiences seem real.  
**Wallace Reid**  
Wallace Reid appears to fine advantage in "Always Audacious." In this picture Mr. Reid plays two parts, one, a society man of wealth and the other a crook. Both men are alike as two peas and this resemblance aids the scheme of the crook to assume the station of the other—to rob him of his wealth and fiancée. He nearly succeeds in his purpose and but for a—but it would be unfair to readers to reveal in advance one of the most smashing climaxes ever seen in a motion picture story.  
Of course, Mr. Reid plays the roles of the crook and his intended victim. How he does it, the skill of the camera man reveals in many thrilling scenes. The picture, which is based on Ben Ames Williams' story, "Toujours de A' Audace," is distinctly worth while.  
**Madaine Travers**  
A strong photoplay of love and action, "The Hell Ship," with beautiful Madaine Travers in the stellar role. This picture is made all the more intense and thrilling by the fact that the entire dramatic action of the film plainly shows, takes place on board a fishing schooner and on a life raft in the waters of the Pacific Ocean.  
Miss Travers, the star, does some very strong work as Paula, the girl captain of a "hell ship," who subdues a mutinous crew, yet finds herself "merely a woman." The closing scene of the picture, involving the final sacrifice of the heroine is beautiful.—Adv.
