

Visit to Maui is Included in World Press Congress Program

Plans for the visit of Maui of the delegates and others who come to the World's Press Congress in Honolulu next fall have been taken up by the entertainment committee at the capital city along practically the lines that was suggested by the editor of this paper at the meeting of newspapermen of the Islands early last month. L. A. Thurston is chairman of the committee on entertainment and has written to D. H. Case, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce on the subject. Before writing he has had conversations with Senators Baldwin and Rice, the latter director of the fair. The subject is one for reference to the Maui County Fair & Racing Association quite as much as the Chamber of Commerce for the visit is to be timed for the fair period.

General Plan Suggested
Mr. Thurston is still unable to forecast the number of delegates and others but says that there will probably be not less than 200 nor more than 400 and that it is plainly impossible to transport and entertain such a number with the local inter-island boats and so it is suggested to charter a Maitson or Shipping Board boat for say a week to take the party from Honolulu to Maui and Hawaii, and the committee is now figuring on that basis. It is suggested, he says, that the steamer leave Honolulu in the morning and coast along the windward coasts of Molokai and Maui to Kahului, arriving in the afternoon. He quotes Messrs. Rice and Baldwin as saying that the evening of the day of arrival and the next day and evening will probably be long enough for the entertainment planned; that they would be here during the fair when

every one will be so busy that a luncheon would be impracticable but a good out of door program would be furnished at the fair, including roping of steers, riding etc., that next day the party could visit Iao Valley and drive through Haiku, Makawao and up to Kula or take other drives and have further entertainment at the fair that evening.

The plan is to utilize the steamer as the sleeping and eating place of the party subject to such accommodations as are available ashore.

Mr. Thurston asks for details at an early date as to program of entertainment here that it may be included in a folder to be issued for and sent to the congress organization, the Honolulu committee not seeking to arrange plans for Maui folk.

Asks About Meeting Expense
He also asks whether Maui is willing to assist in defraying any extra steamer expenses and says the suggestion in general is that those making the trip pay a fixed sum based on the ordinary cost of transportation to Maui and Hawaii and return to Honolulu but that if the cost of a special steamer is much greater than local communities pay the extra cost. It is assumed that he means Maui pay in proportion to the length of the voyage and stay here and Hawaii its proportion for the length of the trip to the Big Island and stay there. Thus if the party were two nights and a day here and two days and a night at Hawaii the expense of the steamer over and above the revenue from the passengers if there be such extra cost.

Honolulu Goes Strong
"We, in Honolulu," continues Mr. Thurston "feel that this Congress gives Hawaii the greatest opportunity for securing publicity that has ever been offered. The delegates will represent 40 different nations and consist of the leading editors and publishers from all over the world. If we give them the time of their lives—and we can do it, we will be getting good value in return for it for the next generation."

"We have a program outlined for Oahu that will make your hair stand on end and you will have to get up early in the morning if you are going to beat it, but knowing as I do that your motto is 'Maui No Ka Oi' I have no doubt that you will keep Maui's end up."

New Pottersfield Plot—Survey and description of a tract of land 0.82 of an acre in area and about three quarters of a mile from Wailuku on the Piha road have been prepared and submitted to manager Penhallow of Wailuku Plantation for approval of the board of directors of the company and the granting by them of its use to the county as a Pottersfield, or burying ground for the indigent. The land belongs to Hawaiian Commercial & Sugar Company and is leased by it to Wailuku Sugar Company.
