Little Girl Seriously Injured by Automobile

Mary Kaoma, a five year old Hawaiian child was struck and seriously injured by an automobile driven by J. R. Curtis on the beach road between Wailuku and Kahului about three o'clock yesterday afternoon. The child sustained a fracture of the skull and concussions and is in a serious condition at Malulani hospital. Curtis says he was driving along the road toward Kahului and watching a child at the roadside lest it attempt to cross in front of him. On the other side were several Hawaiian women and children obscured from his view by an approaching Ford motor truck. From behind the truck the little Kaoma girl ran out in front of his car and was struck by it before he could stop. He had difficulty, he says, to persuade the women to let him take the child to the hospital but prevailed and did so, after which he notified the sheriff's office. This morning the child was reported to have rallied somewhat but her condition is precarious.

It is understood that the library bill has passed the senate with an appropriation of \$20,000 for the Maui library. This is indeed cheering news not only to those who have worked so hard for the bill, but to all of Maui.

OBITUARY

MRS. GEORGE COCKETT In Lahaina, Wednesday morning, Mrs. George Cockett passed beyond after a short illness which induced heart failure. Funeral services were held Wednesday afternoon. Mrs. Cockett was a sister-in-law of Magistrate C. B. Cockett of Lahaina, Mrs. George Cummings of Wailuku and Joseph Cockett of Waikapa.

E. H. PARIS Elwin H. Paris, a native son of Maui, but long a resident of Honolulu died of apoplexy in Honolulu last Friday. Funeral services from his late residence and ritualistic ceremonies at Masonic temple were held Sunday.

Born at Waiehu, this Island, March 2, 1873, Mr. Paris recently passed his forty-eighth birthday anniversary. He received his early education in the schools of the Islands first and then in California, returning to the Islands to enter the employ of E. O. Hall & Son, of which he became a director in 1896 and became its treasurer and manager ten years later. In 1918 Mr. Paris became associated with the Schuman Carriage Company and at his death was its treasurer and manager. He was secretary and director of the Honolulu Merchants Association which later merged with the chamber of commerce, a director of the latter organization and was a Mason and an Elk. Mr. Paris is survived by widow and five children.
