The meeting was now turned over to the senior patrol leader for troop business.

Duly moved and seconded that the troop colors for Troop No. 5 be changed from red and white, to orange and green. Carried.

Reception of candidate George De Mello as a scout of tenderfoot rank. Practice of the scout yells led by Scout Commissioner Hutton, and practice of the Lahaina troop yell led by the scoutmaster.

The color guard for the meeting was selected from the flying eagle patrol. A short talk on wearing of uniforms and of the importance of proper saluting by the scoutmaster followed by a three minute address from the scout commissioner.

Formal repeating of the scout law. Pledge of allegiance to the "American Flag," and the "March Out" of the colors.

With Maui's Girl Scouts

While in Honolulu last week, the local director visited the Oahu Girl Scouts in camp. The fresh air camp supervised by the Palama Settlement has a beautiful location on the beach at Wai'alua across the island from Honolulu. It is a short distance from the railroad station and a grocery store and yet isolated enough to permit a great deal of freedom. There is a main building containing a well equipped kitchen and one large room used as a dining room and recreation hall. The girls live in tiny cottages each accommodating four girls. These face the sea and are very comfortable, then there are a few larger cottages.

There were 50 scouts, parts of four troops, here for five days during Easter vacation and they were having a wonderful time swimming, hiking, playing volley ball and baseball, giving impromptu theatrical, etc. Mrs. Hendry, Honolulu's deputy commissioner was in charge of the camp and assisting her were Miss Black, the Girl Scout executive and five captains. Each captain was officer-of-the-day for one day beginning at 5:00 p. m. A regular program for each day was followed—beginning with drill and setting up exercises at 7:00 a. m. and ending with some kind of stunt in the evening.

A camp is an ideal place for scouts to learn to live together as one big family and besides having a very good time, each girl has an opportunity to learn a great many things first hand. Camping for girls is a great institution, as valuable for girls as for boys and let us hope that the next few years will see as fine a camp on Maui as the fresh air camp on Oahu.
