PUBLIC NOTICE OF SALE OF PUBLIC LANDS AT HONOKAWAI, LAHAINA, MAUI.

Public Notice is hereby given that on Tuesday the 31st, day of May, 1921, at 10 o'clock A. M., at the front door of the Capitol Building, Honolulu, T. H., there will be sold at Public Auction to the highest bidder, pursuant to the provision of Section 358 of the Revised Laws of Hawaii of 1915, portion of Public Lands at Honokawai, Lahaina, Maui, for permanent reservoir site, ditch right-of-way, and pipeline right-of-way purposes, as follows:

1. Land for Reservoir Site, containing, more or less, an area of 3.20 Acres.
2. Land for Ditch Right-of-way, 20 feet wide, from Reservoir Site to Honokawai, Mahinahina 1-4 boundary, containing, more or less, an area of .88 Acres.
3. Land for Pipe-line Right-of-way, 16 feet wide from Northeast boundary of L. C. A. 4793-B Apana 5 to Hanuna, across the Honokawai Stream to the Reservoir Site, containing, more or less, an area of 1.02 Acres.

Total area (more or less, 5.10 Acres. The said lands will be sold subject to the following conditions:

1. If the purchaser shall at any time fail to use the said lands for reservoir site, ditch right-of-way and pipe-line right-of-way purposes, the title thereto shall become void and the land shall revert to and re-vest in the Territory.
2. The Territory reserves the right in itself and to grant to other parties the right and privilege of crossing and using the lands to be sold, with and for such flumes, pipe-lines, power lines, roads, ditches and such rights-of-way and uses as it may deem advisable. With Maui's Girl Scouts

GIRL SCOUTS

The May copy of the American Girl ("A magazine for Girl Scouts and girls who love Scouting") is the Camping Number and contains all kinds of pictures and accounts of last summer's trips, also plans and suggestions for the coming summer. Last year there were approximately 1200 Girl Scouts in 36 camps in 18 different states in the union. The troops usually earn the money themselves to send as many of their number as possible to the nearest camp. The troop at Brookline, Mass., for example sent word to their council that they would be willing to: "Do office work, take care of children, wash windows, beat rugs and do any kind of spring cleaning."

Just as one example of the practical training a girl may gain from attending a camp here is the of first aid instruction followed in the camp: "One disadvantage that every Scout who takes the first aid course either at camp or in the city encounters is that she does not have sufficient opportunity to practice what she is taught in the classes.

"An effort was made last season at Bonnie Brae to overcome this disadvantage. Each day the Red Cross nurse who was in charge of the classes at camp appointed a Scout, who had passed the test in first aid, to be first aider for the day. Every girl receiving a minor injury of any kind was required to report promptly to this girl and receive treatment. All serious cases were turned over to the nurse. No internal remedies were given by the "first aider" without direct instructions from the nurse. "Not only did this system make the girls who were fortunate enough to be chosen as first aiders more self-reliant, but it saved a great deal of the nurse's time and energy."

TROOP NOTES

Lahaina

This news may be a little late but it is very welcome just the same for we had never heard the details of the Wild Rose troop's camping trip. "Lahaina, Maui, May 13, 1921.

"Dear Miss Leonard:

"Just write to let you know that the Girl Scouts are doing fine.

"You wrote to Miss Middleton to tell me to write about the trip to the Coffee Ranch. We went on Friday evening at 6:00 o'clock three or four weeks ago. We reached there about 9:00 o'clock that night. The way was long and very dark and very cold.

"When we reached the house it was very dark and the girls were searching for the lamp. We got in at last and put everything in order and went to bed. The wind was blowing hard and it rained. All through the night it rained and the wind blew. We got up the next morning and ate our breakfast. We looked around the place and ate guavas. We went with the bigger girls to the valleys to see the tunnel. We made leis of ferns. We got home very tired out. We ate our supper. That night the girls played the ukulele and some of the girls danced.

"Miss Middleton took some of our pictures. We got up the next morning and had some Sunday school lessons and meeting. Some of the girls went again but we did not go. We went to pick some guavas to take home. We made some fern leis to take home with us. The truck got stuck in the mud and we helped to get it out. We reached home about 3:00 o'clock.

"We are planning to have a social party and dancing.

"Six of the girls took the tenderfoot test and passed.

"The attendance for the last two weeks were 3 absent and 31 present. The other week 2 absent and 32 present. The last week 3 absent and 31 present.

We have two accounts of the first camping trip on the Wailuku side of island, one from the participants and one from their visitors.

"Editor of Maui News:
"Carnation troop went camping on May 13 and 14 at Kahului beach. We had a great time starting. You know girls always have more baggage than boys. Some of us went in automobiles and some on bicycles. When we got to the beach house we put our things in order and started a fire. Some of the girls went in swimming. We cooked rice, boiled potatoes, roasted corn and had sandwiches, oranges, cake and soda water.

"Roselani troop visited us in the evening. They sang and danced for us. Some of our Japanese girls sang and danced a Japanese dance. We played games and served pop-corn. "What do you think? We went in swimming at 9:00 p. m. and 5:30 a. m. "The most exciting thing happened was during the night. The mosquitoes were so fierce we had to burn some rings of mosquito punk. We hung some on a nail right above the sleeping girls. One of the girls woke up and felt the heat and discovered some of the bed clothes were burning. One of the girl's braids was also beginning to burn. Miss Leonard and Miss Templeton put out the fires. Now we know better than to hang anything with fire over our beds. Some of the girls slept out on the sand around the camp fire. We enjoyed it all very much.

vanished away and we never saw them dance again.
