Second Typesetting Machine Installed

Two Intertype machines are now in operation in the mechanical department of Maui Publishing Company (thus more than doubling its former capacity for typesetting, and other machinery, which includes an electrically operated saw-trimmer, still further increases its capacity for output. The two typesetting machines will set type in six different sizes of letter and, should occasion require it, the ability can be extended to still greater varieties of type, thus minimizing the amount of tedious and slower hand-setting of the old methods. The new machine is a Model C. 2, magazine, electrically operated and electrically heated Intertype, of the latest model and most up-to-date and complete equipment and is the first of its kind ever brought to the Territory of Hawaii. The purchase of the new machinery is in preparation for the coming change in publication of Maui News, to become a semi-weekly publication within the next few weeks, first, and for the necessary expansion of the company's business in commercial printing.

School Without Water—On Wednesday there was no water, even for drinking purposes at Halehaku school. Supervisors Meet—The board of supervisors met Wednesday afternoon and resumed sessions this morning. The session will continue on through the afternoon. House is Burned—A small house near Honolulu, belonging to the ranch and occupied by an employe, was destroyed by fire last Sunday morning. No insurance was carried on the building. Quilt Party—The annual meeting of the Woman's Aid of Wailuku Union Church will be held, and there will be quilt party, at the home of Mrs. E. E. Pleasant next Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock. Dance for Officers—There was a private dance given at the Lahaina Armory Thursday evening by some of the Lahaina people for the officers attached to the naval flotilla now stationed at Lahaina. Drought at Hana—Because of the shortage of water as well as of labor the Hana mill, Kaeleku, has ceased grinding. In town the greatest economy has to be exercised in using water for domestic purposes. Fatal Accident—While hunting last Sunday morning Kim Yong Bong of Camp 1 accidentally discharged his shotgun, the charge terribly lacerating his arm and shoulder. Though taken to Paia Hospital he quickly died of loss of blood. Naval Maneuvers—U. S. Naval flotillas comprising U. S. S. "Rainbow," five submarines of the S group, U. S. S. "Chicago" with four mine layers and one destroyer are lying off Lahaina and will remain here for two weeks for maneuvers. Mary Hoffman Orchestra—At the Lahaina Armory a week from tomorrow night, Saturday, June 18, the Mary Hoffman Orchestra will hold a dance the proceeds of which will go to the fund for the purchase of a saxophone and other jazz instruments. Members Elected—At a meeting of the directors of the Maui County Fair and Racing Association held yesterday afternoon applications were received from 22 membership and favorable action was taken upon all of them. The membership is now approaching 250. Good Fishing—S. E. Kalama, Alfred Furtado, Antone Borba, Jr., and J. H. Gray fished on the way to and from Hana Saturday and brought home a good catch of eleven which included four ulua and four dolphin. All the ulua were caught while Sam Kalama was at the wheel. Maunaolu Alumnae Dance—Large attendance marked the "Poverty Dance" of the Alumnae of Maunaolu Seminary in the Territorial Building last Saturday evening, the rules as to no dressing up being strictly enforced. The affair was highly enjoyable and was a sin every way a success. Must Blast Ledge—Powder was taken to Hana last Saturday for the blasting out of a ledge in front of the new wharf. When the Annie Johnson started to load at the wharf she found there was not enough depth to load to capacity and put out to complete the loading by lighter. Cars in Collision—Dangers of the corner of Main and High streets were again shown Sunday morning when the Hupmobile of E. B. Wicke and a Chevrolet driven by Tomatsu Fujino collided at that spot.
