## Puunene Takes Series From Wacs

### Outfielders' Errors Combined With Hard Hits Give Championship to the Huskies; Locals Bat Weakly.

Puunene wins the first series of the baseball championship. The Huskies made it two straight in the play off of the tie when they met the Wacs last Sunday in the second game of the scheduled doubleheader. It was another off day for the Wacs for Bill Bal held them to four hits and outfield errors helped pile up runs against them at critical moments. Curtis relieved Tom Cockett and was effective allowing only four hits though poor support for him gave the Huskies two more runs.

As in the first game of the play off it was in the third that the Wacs blew up. After Shim had been thrown out, short to first, Haake singled and went to second as Bill Bal took first when hit by pitcher; Tadashi's single filled the bases and four runs came home when Jose Silva bunted the drive sent his way by J. Enos Silva bunted again and Masaichi's double was stretched into three bases. Frank Bal made a mess of the hit from Nakamura's bat and Masaichi crossed the pan. Freitas whiffed but Joe Silva tripped and Nakamura ambled home, Silva dying at first when Shim retired the side. Six runs and four hits.

In the fourth Haake went to second on Frank Bal's error, proceeded to third on a wild throw and scored on Bill Bal's sacrifice.

It was in the fifth the Wacs saved themselves from the whitewash bucket. William Cummings was safe on Enos error, stole second was safe on third on Nakamura's error and scored on Tom Cockett's single.

In the sixth Puunene added another unearned run to its total on two bases on balls and a single by Masaichi.

A shakeup in the Wacs' outfield is expected before they play their first game in the second series with Paia at Wailuku Sunday.

## Paia Turns Tables And Takes Revenge On Lahaina's Nine

Hard hitting by Paia combined with costly errors by Lahaina evened things up for those two teams in their second meeting of the new series, the first game of Sunday's double header. It was a game which was ragged at times but in which the playing tightened in others when men were on bases. Paia won, 9 to 3.

Each team scored in the first, Paia's being a hitless run following a pass that was issued to Chartrand. Maxwell was safe for Lahaina on a wild throw by Roach to Robinson and scored on singles by Mitsu and Tsuda who were left when the next three batters went out in order.

Paia made its second run in the third when Cockett made a home run after English had been retired. Five more came in for the East Maulites in the next stanza. Robinson singled and was safe at second on Mitsu's error; Coleman singled and stole second; Roach laid down a sacrifice; Souza was safe on Mitsu's error; English made the second out and Cockett drove out a second home run; Yemoto was safe on an error and scored on Chartrand's single, the latter being caught at second.

Lahaina put a second run across in the fifth on a single by Tsuda and a triple by Joe Hoke, who died at third when Rodrigues and Kaluakini went out.

In the sixth Paia got one more home run by Souza with one down. A hit by English, pass to Cockett and single by Yemoto followed but no further runs results.

Lahaina scored its third and last in the ninth after Maxwell and Mitsu had fanned. Tsuda went to second on an error at first and scored on Joe Hoke's safe one.

## BASKETBALL
