

### With the Alert Boy Scouts of Maui



THE BIG HIKE

After supper the scouts gathered great quantities of a sort of coarse wood, and dry brush and wood in preparation for the big fire to keep us warm during night. The cold snap was beginning to make its self felt.

Seven o'clock and cold, well I guess yes. The fire was soon burning and hunting and ghost stories were the program of the evening. Some of the scouts did not obeyed the injunction to put up lean toos. The result was that they were up all night keeping the fire going, which meant warmth not only for themselves but for all in camp. Its an ill wind that blows nobody good.

The Scouts lost no time in getting out their riffs pens and preparing broiling steaks. Soon the aroma of cooking goat flesh was ascending to the sky. After a hearty meal the horses were watered and fed and staked out for the night. Then for a short time all were busy in getting in a goodly supply of firewood for a big campfire knowing that the usual campfire stories would be forth-coming.

From midnight on it was pretty cold and the Scouts took turns in replenishing the fire. Early Tuesday morning they were out and getting breakfast. The horses were given the last of the barley, and watered. Then saddling and packing, and the start for the Kaupo Gap was made about eight o'clock.

The Commissioner had been told that the Kaupo Gap was a steep and dangerous trail. It may have been, but it was far more interesting and beautiful than the ascent from Cinda. It certainly was refreshing to have the beautiful green growth on all sides, and the shade was very noticeable during the hot part of the descent.

#### The Beauty of the Gap

The western slopes of the Kaupo Gap are barren and bleak, but the eastern slopes, along which the traveler rides, is covered with verdure, and the great slopes on the left are one mass of beautiful green. Great plateaus spread out before him, and then a sharp decline to the next level. This is the beauty of the gap. It is like a great flight of steps. We finally came out on one of the plateaus and the beautiful sight of the great sloping mountain, reaching clear to the sea, broke before us. Cheer on cheer split from the throats of the troop, and the cry, "Kaupo, Kaupo", rang on the air.

Yes, away below us was Kaupo nestled in emerald greens, browns and sepals a beautiful sight and well worth traveling to see. From where we sat on our horses the trail was like a winding serpent, no more plateaus, but one continual slope to the very ocean edge.

Half way down the trail we finally touched some big water holes and here the men, Scouts and horses, refreshed themselves in the cool sparkling pools. Gee, but it was certainly good after the hard ride down the steep trails.

A short rest and the journey was continued down to the home of Mr. Vierra at Kaupo, where a telephone message was sent on to Kipahulu that the Bronco Busters would reach that place at 8, Wednesday morning. Then on to the Kaupo store to secure grain for the horses. Here the troop rested for about an hour and continued on to the Hawaiian church, where it was

intended that we should camp for the night. No water or feed for the horses being available, it was decided to go on to within about three miles of Kipahulu and camp in one of the gulches where there would be plenty of green grass and water for the animals.

#### "No Place For Weak Heart!"

Here begins some of the most interesting and splendid sights of the whole trip. Trails, well, some people may call them trails, but they are at least from five to ten feet in width and solidly paved with great cobble stones set on edge. And steep, oh my! Pop took one look over the horse's shoulders, for the horse's head was not in sight, and quickly dismounted, saying: "Here's where I walk--no riding down that place for me!"

It is said that these trails were made by the natives about one hundred years ago, and that very little or few of the stones have had to be replaced. It is a wonderful job, but no place for one who has a weak heart or is not used to the saddle.

Mangoes, guavas, thimble-berries, mountain apples, coconuts, bananas, in great abundance.

Did the scouts get any? Say, what do you think we are, anyway? Of course they did, and plenty of them. The feast of their lives!

#### "Pop" Walks Down

After leaving Kaupo the first steep gulch was Kalepo and the first that Pop walked down. Then came Manawalnai where we had intended to make a stop for the night, but no water was in sight, so the trip was continued to Ahele, a wonderful rushing stream of pure cold water. Here a stop was made until 5 p. m.

The Scouts loaded up with mountain apples, mangoes and guavas, and then went in for the first swim since leaving home.

After the horses had thoroughly cooled, they were allowed a very small drink and then fed plenty of luscious green grass which abounded on all sides. Supper was then cooked, horses saddled, packed, and given a final drink, and the start made for Jabalon, where we camped for the night.
