"Down on the Farm"

"Down on the farm," United Artists' latest release, opens when the champion rooster of the ranch puts the sun to work early in the morning of what proves to be the busiest little day ever experienced on any farm. From that moment until the close of this Mack Sennett five-reel comedy sensation every resource of the enormous Sennett studios in the suburbs of Los Angeles is involved with results, thrilling, comic, hilarious, farcical and furiously funny. Thrills are divided by laughter; suspense is relaxed in grins, and dramatic action of grave significance is interrupted by comedy episodes such as only Mack Sennett can devise.

Louise Fazenda in the role of the country girl of beauty and awkward grace, is in the best characterization she has ever offered to motion picture lovers. There is felt the authentic appeal of the legitimate actress in her performance and there is seen the grotesque comedienne whose celebrity is now firmly established. Marie Prevost, graceful and beautiful comedienne of the Sennett forces plays the role of a badgered but faithful wife of a poor villager, the victim of the town's Shylock and a bill for back rent. The villain in the case—a sort of cross between a "Turkish Don Juan" and a "loan shark"—is played with rare power and comic results of seriousness by James Finlayson. Little John Henry, Jr., the star baby of filmland is seen in episodes ranging from cute to tragic and his faithful and gallant friend, Teddy, the Sennett Dog Star participates nobly in scenes of hazard and thrill. Likewise Pepper, the feline actress of many moods, is seen in moments of climax authority while the entire menagerie of feathered

and four-footed "ensemble actors" are involved in the spectacular events of this rustic masterpiece.

"Down on the farm" is an unusual comedy of that type of quality that is derived from its unique blending of many elements—comedy and tragedy; satire and straight drama; character delineation and grotesqueries, humor and pathos, merry and grave moods. It is a surface attack on the emotions and will not fail to set motion picture fans in a whirl of shifting sensations. It is Mack Sennett's genius in fullest revelation.

"THUNDER ISLAND"

If you miss Edith Roberts in "Thunder Island" a romantic cruise through Southern waters, thrills to beat a honeymoon, fast action that will accustom you to gunfire and the charming screen companionship of the lovely little star of such successes as "Lascas" and "The Fire Cat."

"Thunder Island" is a roaring, rumbly, crackling drama of a little Mexican shepherd's encounter with a mock love, a sure enough lover, dark-skinned bandits, pirates of the pearl fisheries and freebooting mariners.

The story was written by Beatrice Grimshaw as "My Lady of the Island" but Norman Dawn, the Universal director, took a photodramatic license and shifted the action from the South Seas to the picturesque peninsula of Lower California, yet preserving the basic theme with additional punch.

When the narrative opens Miss Roberts is seen as a little Mexican girl tending her flocks on the slopes over the opalescent Gulf of California. The pastoral trend of her life is altered by a death-bed marriage to a rich old Spaniard who takes that means to make her heiress to his fortune. He dies after the girl has left but an overseer assumed his identity and claims the girl as his wife. Her escape and her thrilling rescue by a young American pearl hunter.

Follow Bush Fires

SYDNEY, N. S. W., Jan. 3—(Associated Press Mail)—Bush fires have been devastating some of the richest of the western districts of New South Wales for more than a week and the affected zone now embraces approximately 80,000 acres, bounded by walls of flame over 100 miles long.

Men have been fighting day and night inside this area against the roaring flames, which produced a glare upon which the eyes could not gaze at close quarters. Hundreds of the fighters, with bloodshot eyes, begrimed faces and singed bodies have been struggling to save many valuable properties and the lives of thousands of heads of stock.

Many stories of bravery have come out of the region. One young man dashed through a high wall of flame in an endeavor to save the woolshed on Killaloola, which a line of flames was approaching. He saved the building and his bravery will be recognized by the plantation owners.

In another case a young man, facing the menace of being cut off from all means of escape, fought the flames from approaching his father's property for 72 hours. He was on the point of collapse when relief arrived.
