## Local Junior League Will Commence Play On Sunday, March 5

Formation of the Wailuku junior baseball league has been completed and a double header will open the league season on Sunday, March 5. Preliminary details were settled at a meeting of the junior baseball committee at the Wailuku gym Tuesday afternoon.

St. Anthony Alumni has declined to enter a team in the league and the season will open with five teams in the running. Representatives from the Sakuras, Asahi's, Sports, Wacs, and Maui High School met with C. A. Puck and signified their intentions of entering the league. Each manager presented a list of players to the committee and though some were held in doubt owing to the committee's definition of a junior player, the lists have now received the official okay and practice has commenced in earnest.

It was decided to allow a few players that have appeared for a few games on the senior leagues but are not in the highly rated class and others that played in such games merely for try out purposes to enter the junior league as it is the intent of the league to improve the junior element in order that it may, in time, reinforce the line-up of the senior teams.

Harry Kaya will manage the Sakuras and William Kan the Asahi's, Leland Lewis will pilot the Sports, George Cummings, the Wacs and Ralph Baldwin will attempt to steer the Hi School to the flag. Cummings caused a ripple of laughter to sweep over the meeting when he avowed his intentions of covering first base for his team. The committee found that he was not a junior but decided that the exercise would do him good and were unanimous in their approval that he be allowed to enter the league.

All games will be played on the Wailuku field and the schedule calls for a double header each Sunday until the close of the junior series.

The season will be a short one, in order that it will in no way handicap the senior league. Ten games are to be played, each team meeting the other twice and unless two or more teams are tied for first place at the close of the season there will be no post series. Should any teams be tied there will probably be a three game series for the championship.

On paper the teams appear to be very evenly matched and the "credentials committee" whose duty it was to pass upon the eligibility of each player predict a good brand of baseball will be seen when the umpire says "play ball!"

## St. Anthony's Quintet May Defend Maui In Meet At Honolulu

The Alumni Alerts will go to Honolulu early in March as Maui's representatives in the Inter-Island basketball championship series, should the sending of a team to compete in the series be sanctioned at a meeting to be held of the team representatives of the Central Maui league.

The defeat of Maui High School by Kahului on Tuesday night decisively established the St. Anthony quintet as champions of the Central Maui league and places upon their shoulders the task of upholding the traditions of Maui if they go to Honolulu as expected.

Owing to the short interval between the closing date of the Central Maui league and the opening of the meet in Honolulu it was decided at the recent meeting of the Athletic Committee of the Maui County Fair and Racing Association to set back the series to be played by the leaders of the Central and West Maui leagues for the Maui championship until a later date. C. L. Bowker represented West Maui at the meeting assented to the proposal that the leader of the Central league be the team to go to Honolulu should any team be sent.

In the near future a meeting of the team representatives of the Central Maui league will be held, at which time an appropriation of \$75 will be asked to be made from the funds of the league to help finance the representative team. The meeting will be held at the \$75 is as far as they will be asked to help the project and that should the team that goes to Honolulu not receive sufficient support there to tide it over the deficit will have to be made up among the team members themselves. On the other hand the \$75 will be refunded in whole or part if Honolulu receipts warrant it.

It is felt in sporting circles here that the Alerts are worthy of the opportunity that has presented itself and will make a creditable showing against the inter-island teams they would meet in the series though handicapped by having to play on courts larger than any on Maui. Clean play and good sportsmanship have been noticeable in the majority of the games the team has played during the league season here and such, if continued, is thought certain to make a good impression on the Honolulu fans.

Should the team be sent, they will in all probability leave Maui about March 8, an early enough date to give them a few days to recover from any effects the trip on the water may have on them and also that they may practise for a short time at least on the strange floor that the series will be played upon beginning March 11. If the Central Maui League approves the plan and appropriates the necessary funds, then it is to be urged that the sporting element here step solidly behind the team and send it on its way with the good will of every team and organization.

## National League's Schedule Announced

NEW YORK, Feb. 15—(Associated Press Mail)—The National League schedule made public today, provides for a season of 154 games, 77 of which are to be played on the home diamond and an equal number abroad by each of the eight clubs composing the league. The season begins on Wednesday, April 12 and closes on Sunday October 1. The opening games will bring Brooklyn to New York; Boston to Philadelphia; Chicago to Cincinnati-6 and Pittsburgh to St. Louis.

The Saturday, Sunday and holiday games are well distributed between the eastern and western clubs. The Brooklyn Club receives the greatest number of Sunday games at home and Pittsburgh the largest number abroad. The Pirates also have the largest number of Saturday home games. Boston and Pittsburgh are scheduled for three holiday games on home diamonds and Chicago has an equal number abroad. Brooklyn and Chicago lead the league in the total of Saturday, Sunday and holiday games awarded with 51. New York and Cincinnati are second with 50. Kahului spilled the beans for the Hi Quintet Tuesday night by defeating the school team 22-17. That defeat assures the Alumni Alerts of the Central Maui basketball championship and the trip to Honolulu as contestants for the Islands' championships.

Greater surprise could not have been handed the crowd of fans and rooters who lined the rail of the gallery for it had been regarded as a foregone conclusion before the start of the game that the Hi school would win over the Harbor Town boys by an overwhelming score.

That prediction was well supported during the first two quarters of the game and at the half the East Maui lads lead 12-5.

Opening the second half Kahului began the rally that brought them victory. Beautiful team work and the surprising accuracy of Larsen and Enemoto at shooting baskets soon placed the final result in doubt and brought cheer after cheer from the Kahului supporters. Hi School seemed to be thrown in a daze by the fast and accurate playing that was being shown by the too lowly rated opponents. During the entire last half of the game the Hi School added but five points to their total score. Rego, the star basket getter of the team was not playing up to his usual form and A. L. Yee captured the individual high score honors during the contest with a total of eight points.

Larsen and Enemoto shared the honors for the victors, each securing 10 points for his team. Ah Hoy scored the remaining field goal for Kahului.

By reason of Kahului's victory Tuesday night all doubt is removed from the Alerts winning the championship. Had the High School won the game and then been able to defeat the league leaders in their coming meeting the two teams would have been tied for the championship and a probable series of three games would have resulted. Now, however, should the Alerts be defeated in each of their remaining games to be played they will still hold the lead by a fair margin.

## Sports Tie Again

The Sports walloped the cellar ragnates, Puunene, to the tune of 28-10 and as the result remain deadlocked with Kahului for fifth position in the league standings. Throughout the first half of the game it was a tit fort at affair and very prettily played, the half ending with the teams locked in an 8-8 tie.

As in the first game of the evening fast scoring did not develop until the latter periods of play but in this contest it was a one sided rally. The Sports scored 20 points in the last half and held the Puunene five scoreless until the closing moments when they managed to score a goal from the field.

Weight easily led in high scoring and accumulated 17 points. Shimoda starred for the Puunene team getting a total of six.

No Changes For Cup  
Respective positions in the race for the high score cup remain unchanged and only two players that can be counted in the running appeared in Tuesday night's games. Rego retains fourth position, his score now stand-

ing at 100 and Larsen fifth with a total of 94.

Tonight's Games  
Maui Hi Schools only opportunity to avenge its first defeat by the Alerts comes tonight when the two teams meet for the second and last time. Despite the loss of the game to Kahului on Tuesday, the Hi School fans express confidence of a victory over the league leaders.

Puunene meets the Wacs in the second game of the evening and the result is hardly in doubt. Both games should prove of great interest to the fans however, as the leading stars in the high score cup race appear in the games.

## Parisian Fight Fans

### Make Clean up When Georges Bests Cook

PARIS, Jan. 27—(Associated Press Mail)—Five hundred Parisians who went to London to see the Carpenter-Cook bout are reported to have returned to Paris with many English pounds sterling after all expenses had been paid. They found it difficult to place money before the fight, followers of Cook asking odds of four to one, according to the statement of one of the French party. Most of the money was wagered between the second and the third round. Carpenter had been consistently giving ground during the first two rounds, Cook many times having the Frenchman against the ropes giving the impression of greater strength.

After the bell sounded at the finish of the second round, a prominent "boulevardier"—a close friend of Des-camps—arose and shouted: "Five hundred pounds even Carpenter wins inside six rounds." Throughout the arena at once there was an exchange of accepting nods ranging from 100 to 500 pounds sterling.

The rest is pugilistic history. The fight seemed to begin at the tap of the bell for the third round and it was a much humbler Cook who went to his corner after the third round.

A noble lord impressed by the showing made by Cook in the first two rounds is said to have dropped £1,000 coincident with the dropping of Cook for the final count in the fourth round.

A total of 25,032,784 francs was distributed in stakes and prize money to owners of winning, place and show horses at the various tracks in France during the year 1921.

Longchamp leads with 6,948,475 francs; Saint Cloud comes next with 3,356,950, and Maisons Lafitte is third with 2,281,850.

Ksar, Madame Edmond Blanc's crack three-year-old, led the list of winning horses for the year, despite the fact that he ran unplaced in the Grand Prix, which was won by Mr. Watson's Lemonora.

A campaign has been started by the leading sporting paper of France, for the avoidance of English words in sport where a French equivalent is available. Some equivalents have even been coined lately.

Boxers who have delighted in prefixing their names with English terms such as "Battling" Siki and "Knock-out" Marchand will become Siki le "Batailleur" and Marchand "l'Assommeur."

Some of the English words which it is desired to avoid and their equivalent in French are:

Referee: arbitre; trainer: entraineur; team: equipe; race: course; deuce (in tennis): egalite; hook: crochet; seconds: soigneurs; off-side: hors-jeu; goals: buts; forward: avant half back: demi; time: temps. The "Auto" has been unable to find a term for "knockout" although it is a situation which is quite frequent in French rings.

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
