Canned Food Week to Be Widely Observed Beginning Tomorrow

Plans to make "National Canned Foods Week," March 1 to 8, a successful event have been made by the National Canners' Association, according to the latest issue of The Canner, a trade magazine that circulates among those interested in the canning industry. The inside front cover page of the Saturday Evening Post of March 4 has been purchased to advertise the week as well as extensive and expensive space in other publications. Retail merchants everywhere on the mainland and in Hawaii will devote their windows to displays of canned foods and a great many of them will have demonstrations in their stores. The Joseph Campbell company, manufacturers of canned soups, has already used a page of the Saturday Evening Post in connection with "Canned Food Week." Direct mail advertising is being used to bring the week to the attention of approximately 100,000 retailers throughout the United States and its possessions. It is understood that the week will be observed in the Philippines, Alaska and in the Canal Zone as well as in Hawaii and the entire mainland. Libby McNeill and Libby has used the Ladies' Home Journal for its advertising of the week and that company is sending free window display material to all dealers using the Libby products. This is also being done by many other canners.

Retailers to Cooperate

The local observance of the week will be as general as that on the mainland, according to A. H. Tarleton, secretary of the Pineapple Packers' Association and the man who is in charge of the week here. He says that all islands are being covered with paid advertising and that all the islands will respond to the appeal for window displays, demonstrations and other methods of getting the idea across. Mr. Tarleton has obtained a statement from Dr. Rosenau, director of research of Harvard University, who says "The most wholesome and sanitary food that reaches the American table is canned goods." In this connection, M. B. Bairos, Territorial Food analyst, says that there is no doubt but every force of the government and the canners themselves is at work to protect the public from getting canned goods that is unsanitary in any way.

Purity is Sought

"When the public health bureau started business a few years ago it met with opposition on the part of the canners, the retail merchants and even the public. It was felt that the government was sticking its finger into private business, but now there is most hearty cooperation between the health officials and the businesses for everyone on the canners on down the line to the consumer realizes that when a can of food is condemned as unfit for sale it is to the best interests of everyone concerned that it should not be sold. "The larger grocers and retail merchants carrying canned foods are now in the habit of asking us to come and inspect a new shipment and give them a condemnation order on any of the stock that is doubtful. We have several ways of telling whether or not canned goods are in perfect condition, and I can safely say that there are nowhere near as many cases found today where goods must be destroyed as there were a few years ago because the canners realize it is to their best interests to send out stock that is as perfect as they can make it, and they are doing so."

Canned Food Week is coming this year at a time when the prices of nearly every variety of canned food is at the lowest point it has reached in some months. It is freely predicted that here will be an upward tendency on all varieties of canned goods very shortly. Grocers are planning to make material reductions on case and dozen lots of assorted tins during the week of March 1 to 8 it is understood.
