Oregon U. Track Meet Rouses Wide Interest

EUGENE, Ore., March 5—(Associated Press Mail)—All Oregon universities and colleges are expected to send their athletes to the first Oregon Relay Carnival to be held at the state university's new \$10,000 Hayward Field track path here April 14 and 15. Entries will come from the University of Oregon, the Oregon Agricultural College, Willamette University, Pacific University, Linfield College, Albany College, Reed College, North Pacific Dental College, Pacific College, Philomath College, Monmouth Normal School, Chemawa Indian School and Mount Angel College.

In addition to relays, the meet will include a pentathlon and several special track and field events. The pentathlon will include the 200-meter run, broad jump, discus and javelin throws and the 1,500-meter run.

At the meet, which will be the first of its kind in Oregon, the athletes of the schools outside the Pacific Coast and Northwest Conferences will have a chance to meet the conference members, which are the Oregon Aggies, University of Oregon and Willamette.

Rules of the National Intercollegiate Association will govern the meet. Competition will be in the following three classes: first, the University of Oregon and the Oregon Aggies; second, all other institutions and third, the university and Aggie freshmen.

Wacs Clinch Second Place and Win Crack At Maui Basket Title

Maui Hi School quintet was completely outclassed by the Wacs in the battle for second place in the Central league that was staged on the local gym floor Tuesday night.

With the victory safely tucked away the Wacs finish second with a percent of .692 and will be the runner up of the Central league in the All-Maui championship basketball tournament that begins next Tuesday night, March 21, at Wailuku.

The Wacs piled up a total of 10 points in the first quarter and held Hi School scoreless in the first frame. Medeiros attempting to pass found himself blocked and heaved the ball from the center station into the net. Rodrigues scored, his sixth, for the game and Rego came back for the Hi's with a field goal and a converted foul. Score at third quarter, Wacs 22, Hi 11.

Each team scored but two points in the last period. Rodrigues dropped the ball through the hoop from the field and Rego on a 2-1 foul converted both tries into goal. Final score Wacs 24, Hi School 13.

The guarding of "Hoki" Wilhelm and Medeiros was the feature of the evening.

Four Teams in Fine Mettle Await Opener In Maui Basket Play

The struggle by the four leading teams of the Central and West Maui Basketball leagues for the title of Maui's champions of the casaba game will open on Monday night at the Wailuku gym. A double header is on the card for that night and the first game will start at 8 o'clock.

The hopes of West Maui are rested upon the Lahaina Athletic Association and the Lahainaluna quintets who will have opposing them from the Central league the undefeated Alumni Alerts and W. A. C., a hard fighting aggregation of basketball tossers.

The two leaders in the respective leagues will open activities in the championship series. The Alerts, who played a losing but brilliant contest at tremendous odds against the strong National Guard team of Honolulu in the recent Inter-Island matches will meet the L. A. A., the top notchers of the West Maui league and the starters whistle is expected to send these two teams into a battle for supremacy that will long be remembered.

W. A. C. versus Lahainaluna will be the second event in the big night for basketball fans. The Wacs have been seen in action in the games of the local league many times and the whirl wind finish shown by them in the last few games have won them almost of followers. Lahainaluna however, is not to be held too lightly in regard and their recent defeat by the L. A. A. in the deciding game of the West Maui series has spurred them on to greater efforts, it is said, and a good game is looked forward to when the teams meet.

Six Game Series
The series will be played in six games, each team meeting the other once. The championship will be reckoned on a percentage basis and the team having the highest number of victories will be the winner. In case of a tie the tying teams will play an extra game.

Three games will be played in Wailuku and three games in Lahaina. At Wailuku the contests will begin at 8 o'clock and at Lahaina 7:30 P. M.

"Strangler" Lewis Will Try Dempsey In Mixed Battle

Lewis' Manager Claims Champ Wrestler Can Finish Dempsey in 20 Minutes; Kearns Replies "Let's Go"

NASHVILLE, Tenn., March 16—(Associated Press)—Billy Sandow, manager of Ed. "Strangler" Lewis, the worlds champion wrestler has deposited a check for \$5,000 with the sporting editor of the Nashville Banner the wager connected with Lewis' challenge to Jack Dempsey for a mixed match to a finish. The conditions of the challenge allow Dempsey to enter the ring with bare fists and permit hi to either wrestle or box. Lewis is confined to wrestling with no holds to be barred.

Sandow said the challenge is issued to prove that wrestling is superior to boxing as a means of self defense. He said he would be willing to bet that in such a match Lewis would defeat Dempsey inside of 20 minutes.

NEW YORK, March 16—(Associated Press)—Jack Kearns replied to the challenge made by Sandow and said Jack Dempsey is ready to meet Lewis in either a straight boxing or a mixed fight.

Missouri Tigers May Change Football Head

COLUMBIA, Mo., March 4—(Associated Press Mail)—When the Missouri Tigers enter the gridiron season next fall, they will probably be under the direction of a new member, according to Z. G. Clevenger, athletic director at the Missouri University.

Clevenger has indicated that a complete change in the coaching staff is contemplated. The change, he states, has been under consideration since the close of the football season last fall.

At least two prominent candidates for the head coaching position on the football staff have come to Columbia to confer with Director Clevenger and President J. C. Jones of the university recently. J. B. McCormick, Philadelphia who has been assistant football coach at Princeton University and A. Byron Wimberly, at present football coach at Illinois Wesleyan University, Bloomington, are the two candidates who have been in conference here with university officials.

Others who are considered as candidates for the position include Gene Van Gent, University of Wisconsin star, once assistant at Missouri and later with the University of Texas and now with Leland Stanford, Jack Sutherland of Lafayette and Bert Ingwerson, former Illinois halfback.
