Will Examine Soldiers—United States Attorney S. C. Huber, during his stay on Maui is ready to examine United States soldiers who are aliens but seek naturalization as citizens. New Calendars Ready—Alexander & Baldwin's new quarterly calendars for the third quarter of the year are now being distributed to callers at the Baldwin Bank in Kahului and its Wailuku branch. Case is Continued—In the district court at Wailuku this morning the case of the Territory vs Higashiguchi, one of several alleged violators of the prohibition law, went over a week on motion of Enos Vincent, attorney for the defendant. Kilauea to Hana—The Inter-Vent steamers Kilauea arrived this morning instead of Saturday morning at Kahului and proceeded on to Hana and other Maui ports. She will resume her regular schedule tomorrow leaving Kahului at her usual Saturday night sailing hour. Pauwela Pine Pack—At Pauwela cannery this week there have been running three lines and the output has been 3600 cases a day. Superintendent Wolf reports. He says the dry weather permits going along more slowly than if there were more showers and that he looks for the "peak of the pack" before the end of next week. Harris of the Maui Amusement Company the announcement of the programs he will render. There will be no repetitions of numbers in his two Maui appearances and rare treats are assured to his hearers. Instead of 'At Night' he sang 'Mother o Mine' putting all the homesick longing of a boy who has felt the loss of 'Mother o Mine' into his voice. "The third part of the program was comprised of old fashioned songs. Here he sang 'Annie Laurie,' 'Bonnie Sweet Bessie,' Kreislser's 'Cradle Song' and Tosti's 'Parted,' closing this part of the program with that beautiful love song 'Forgotten.' In these songs, the depth and resonance of his voice surprised an audience already prepared by advance reports for the wonderful. "Here, too, he showed his wonderful range from the low notes of the 'Cradle Song' to the high octaves touched in the strains of Annie Laurie. The encore 'Forgotten' was a gem of tender love and sentiment. The sweet melody of a Hawaiian music boy, backed by years of training, made this song one of his best offerings. Hawaiian Songs "The last part of his program was part Hawaiian and part McCormack. Here he sang in his own tongue to his own people the song of a man who loves his native land, is glad to be home and breaks forth into the soft harmony of Hawaii's music. And in 'I Hear You Calling Me' and Tosti's 'Good Bye' he made us think the soul and voice of McCormack had indeed stepped across the blue Pacific to sing through him to the land of Hawaii. When the last fond notes of 'Good Bye' swelled to the roof, it seemed as if his throat would burst. "And when, in response to enthusiastic calls and requests he sang 'Aloha,' the house went wild.
