Peter Souza is the gentleman in question, hailing from Wailuku. But Peter had an off day Sunday and as a star could be placed in that category that the New York Boxing Commission commands.

In the first canto Peter bungled three and Haiku registered a big "3" on the tally sheet. After the Wacs had slipped a counter over in the first part of the opening inning with out a hit, Joe Souza, the Haiku shortstop reached first on his namesake's error. Chartrand missed a bunt on his third strike and ambled to the bench. Then Peter erred again. Bill Blaisdell another debut to the majors reached second and Joe romped home Robinson hit for the circuit and brought Blaisdell in ahead of him. Neil Blaisdell, who also made his first appearance in the seniors on Sunday but who has been going great guns twirling in the East Maui League, was the third player to profit on Peter's bungling but it came to naught when Yamamoto lifted a high one to left and Haole was retired at first.

Its All Over

The game might as well have been called at that stage instead of worrying along for some two hours for the Wacs at no time regained the lead or threatened. Bal scored in the second on an error, wild pitch, and a passed ball.

George yanked Souza after the Wacs had been retired and shifted Wells from the mound to third and placed Moniz in the box.

Singles by Souza, Chartrand, and Robinson and errors by Freitas and Walwaiole sent three men home for Haiku.

There was no further scoring done until the Wacs were at bat in the fifth. Silva opened the canto by singling and pilfered second. Ah Sam laid down a sacrifice and Silva scored on Regos' hit to the infield.

A fast double play nipped a Haiku rally in the same inning. Robinson singled for the third time and Neil Blaisdell doubled. Reis popped to Moniz who doubted Foster at third.

The ruckus meandered along as far as the sixth frame and just about the time the fans were wondering when Rice's gang would break loose, it happened. Base hits by Rolph (who had replaced Keiki) and by Souza, Chartrand, and Reis, aided by the bingles of Rego and Walwaiole allowed a quartet of Rice Birds to tally.

The final counter came in the eighth when Chartrand lead off with a double and scored on the left fielders miff of Blaisdells drive.

Blaisdell Twirls Fine

Neil Blaisdell who played his first game in the major league Sunday showed the fans some real pitching. Blaisdell struck out thirteen men and walked but three. Some comment was heard in the first inning that the youngster was wild, but rather than that it was Yamamoto's inability to hold the fast ball that Neil delivers. Reis relieved Yamamoto at the receiving end after one run had scored in the second and little trouble was had during the remainder of the game.
