

### McCumber Scathes Senate's Delay Of Bonus Bill

#### Chairman Of Finance Committee Tells Senate Its Time To Show Their Not Playing With Soldier

(ASSOCIATED PRESS) WASHINGTON, Aug. 24.—The senate rapidly advanced on the consideration of the bonus bill and it is believed that its passage this week is possible. Forty seven committee amendments were accepted within 15 minutes. The bills opponents are disposed to allow its passage by the senate believing that President Harding will veto the bill in its present form and are planning to concentrate their strength to prevent its passage over the veto.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23.—Senator Porter J. McCumber, republican, from North Dakota and chairman of the senate finance committee, opening the debate on the house bonus bill, declared the enactment of bonus legislation was demanded by every principle of financial justice and every principle of political honor. The amended bill carries a bank loan certificate provision instead of the original proposal of a cash bonus. McCumber said the term "bonus" was a misnomer and declared the purpose of the bonus was to equalize in some measure with those who were under the colors with that received by those staying at home and profiting by what he characterized a wild and drunken orgy of extravagance that accompanied the war. He told the senate, "The time would come to show that the senate was not attempting to play politics with the American soldier and that it was acting in good faith when it passed the first bonus bill just before the elections in 1920." McCumber declared the necessary funds could be provided from the refunded foreign debts and said there had been unnecessary

delay in its refunding. He added that the bonus would cost the government a total of \$3,845,000,000, to be spread over a period of 40 years.

### Senate Committee Approves President Harding's Plan

(ASSOCIATED PRESS) WASHINGTON, Aug. 23.—The house committee on rules gave preference to the Bland coal investigation bill which provides for an investigation by a commission on which both miners and operators will be represented but later reversed its decision giving preference to a measure approved by President Harding, for a commission composed entirely of impartial public representatives.

### Labor Leader Denounces Harding As Wallflower

(ASSOCIATED PRESS) POUGHKEEPSIE, N. Y., Aug. 23.—Timothy Healy, President of the fireman's union, speaking before the New York federation of labor, charged that President Harding had broken his faith with the striking shop men in his efforts to settle the rail troubles. He referred to the President as "A great big wallflower in the Whitehouse", and referred to Taft as "A man who could not get a job as constable or dog catcher by the electorate any where in the United States."

### Lieutenant Colonel Beck Died In Line Of Duty

(ASSOCIATED PRESS) WASHINGTON, Aug. 23.—Secretary of war Weeks made public the findings of a special army board relative to the investigation into the affairs surrounding the death of Lieutenant Colonel Paul W. Beck last April. The findings of the board were as follows. Lieutenant Colonel Paul W. Beck was shot by Judge Jean Day in the latter's home at Oklahoma City, last April. The officer met death "In the line of duty."

### Two Striking Districts Terrorized By Bombs

(ASSOCIATED PRESS) SAN BERNARDINO, Aug. 23.—Twelve gaspibe bombs, chemically timed, exploded in the residential district of the Santa Fe Railroad's employees. Scores of persons were terrorized but none injured. Officers carrying sawed off shotguns are patrolling.

Reports from East St Louis say several sticks of dynamite exploded on the roof of the Chicago Alton roundhouse three miles north of there. Houses in a radius of three miles were shaken by the explosion. Twelve shopmen were shaken up but none injured.

### State Officials Look For New Era Of Peace In Cuba

(ASSOCIATED PRESS) WASHINGTON, Aug. 23.—State department officials regard the Cuban political reconstruction program as nearing completion and promising an era of restored confidence and tranquility. Crowder is the constant advisor to Cuban officials who are constructing many changes in the governmental machinery, eliminating the fiscal judicial officials whom are retarding need reforms, and are effecting sweeping rehabilitation, tax collecting and disbursing systems.

### California Senator Declares Fruit Growers In Distress

(ASSOCIATED PRESS) WASHINGTON, Aug. 23.—Senator Samuel M. Shortridge, republican from California told the senate he had received from growers and shippers in California messages stating the conditions there were at critical stage as the result of the interrupted transportation. Shortridge urged the Interstate Commerce Commission to allocate all available refrigerator cars to that state.

### Michael Collins Shot And Killed From Ambush

#### Leader Of Provisional Government Mourned By All Ireland and England; Dire Forebodings Predominate

(ASSOCIATED PRESS) LONDON, Aug. 23.—Michael Collins is dead. The famed Irish Republic leader and agitator who assumed the active leadership of the provisional government in Ireland following the death of Arthur Griffiths, was shot and killed a few hours after his departure from Cork, where, appearing in the full uniform and regalia of commander-in-chief, he had received a great ovation. It was Collins' first appearance in the uniform of commander.

Collins' death, following that of Griffiths, was the removal of the second prominent figure of the Irish strife within ten days, just as the defeat of the southern irregulars was considered complete.

### Attack From Ambush

Later dispatches from Dublin say that seven of the Free Stater's staff officers were accompanying Collins when he was shot from ambush.

Several soldiers were killed and wounded during the attack on Collins' party, including Major General Doleton who was slightly injured. The assassination occurred between Macroom and Bandon where Collins and his staff were ambushed by a large number of irregulars. Just as the attack was beaten off a bullet struck Collins in the head and he died a few moments afterward. Collins' last words as he lay dying last night, addressed to Major General Doleton were, "Foregive them."

The assassination has created a profound sensation in London and deep expressions of regret come from all quarters. Government officials are shocked. Lloyd George in a message to William T. Cosgrove the active chairman of the Irish provisional government conveys his sympathy for the loss of what he termed in his own words, "The loss of one of Ireland brilliant sons at a time when Ireland needed his special qualities of courage and resolution."

Reports from Dublin say that city is stunned by the news of Collins' death. He was only 31 years of age. Newspapers print dire forebodings for Ireland's future.

Collins body will be taken to Cork from Bandon and thence sent by steamer to Dublin where a national funeral will be held, prior to which the body will lie in state. All Ulster is profoundly stirred owing to the assassination. It was announced at Dublin the Dail will be summoned immediately.

### Body Lies In State

Thursday, Collins' body arrived from Cork and was borne through crowded streets to the city hall where it will lie in state until the burial on Monday. Collins party who were with the commander during the attack numbered twelve and say the attackers numbered at least 250 and poured a crossfire of machine guns into the Free Stater's.

At Cork the grief over Collins' death is immeasurable. The entire city is shocked and resentment is strongly felt throughout the national army. Troops arriving from the north wept upon learning of his death. It has been learned that the troops and great mass of people idolized their leader.

### Successor Needed

A successor to Collins is being considered. It is admitted that those remaining do not possess his varied talents and dominating powers that will enable them to combine the whole ministry and defeat the irregulars. Richard Mulcahy the chief of staff of the republican army is considered to hold the entire confidence of the rank and file. William T. Cosgrove the acting head of the provisional government is noted for his tenacity at pursuing a policy once he has determined upon it. George Gavah Dugly the foreign minister of the provisional government is also regarded as a great promise.

### Seaplane Wrecked When Landing Is Attempted

(ASSOCIATED PRESS) NEW YORK, Aug. 23.—The seaplane Sampaio Correia, en route to South America was wrecked when Pilot Hinton attempted to make a landing on the water. The five members of the crew clung to the half submerged wreckage until the U. S. Denver arrived and picked them up.

### KALIHU VET'S BENEFIT

(ASSOCIATED PRESS) HONOLULU, Aug. 21.—Governor Farrington has received word from L. B. Hodges, acting director of the veterans bureau, that veterans and inmates of the Kalihui hospital will receive three dollars daily subsistence. Counsel heretofore held that such benefit was illegal but the ruling was changed following the receipt of information from Dr. Trotter.

### Warm Session Held In Makawao Court In Liquor Case

In the District Court of Makawao Monday morning there was a lively session before Magistrate Pacheco in the hearing of T. Kitihara charged with violation of the prohibition law. It is the second time he has been arrested by Crabbe, having pleaded guilty the first time and paid a fine. The hearing was concluded and decision is expected to be handed down next Monday.

One new point arises in the Kitihara case. He was neither the owner nor the tenant of the premises upon which Crabbe entered without a search warrant. He is employed as caretaker for Angus McPhee, the prosecution holds, and Crabbe had permission of McPhee to enter McPhee's premises. Attorney Murphy holds there was no proof adduced to show that the premises entered upon by Crabbe were those of McPhee. The prosecution claims that entering upon premises owned by a person who consents is no violation of the rights of an employee of such person on those premises. It undertook to show that McPhee told Crabbe that the law was being violated and he might go on his premises but such testimony was not admitted.

Attorney Murphy asked Crabbe only four questions on cross examination. Whether he did not meet the defendant at Makawao on his way to the premises? Whether the defendant did not know him to be a federal officer? Whether he had a search warrant? and whether he had any warrant? Crabbe answered the first two questions in the affirmative and the second two in the negative.

Though the liquor seized was admitted as evidence the defense claims that there was no proof that its alcoholic content was more than a half of one percent. The prosecution claims that Crabbe testified it was "okolehao" which name implies an excess of alcoholic content over that permitted by the law and that Crabbe further said he had tested it. Deputy County Attorney Crockett appeared for the prosecution and is reported to have asked the magistrate to punish the counsel for the defense for contempt. It is said that the magistrate replied that unless better order were maintained he would fine all counsel and all witnesses.
