

## Mandarins Win Second Series By Score of 7-2; Fair-Time Series For Island's Title Is Possibility

"Orientals" Settle Contest In Third Canto, Tallying Three Three Times; Good Crowd On Hand To Witness Title Fray At Fair Grounds Diamond.

The Chinese fell on Reis in the third inning of Sunday's game and drove three tallies across the plate, winning the second series championship and the right to meet Haiku in a series of games for the Island baseball title. The series will probably be played during the County Fair, opening October 12th, at Kahului.

The fracas ended up with the Mandarins occupying the correct end of a 7 to 2 score.

The first series champs opened the game by driving a counter across the rubber in the first stanza and momentarily the game took on the appearance of the same old story in the same old way. But from then until the last of the seventh canto the Rice Birds were held scoreless while the Chinese amassed a total of seven runs.

Reis, hurling for Haiku, was touched for safeties frequently and was relieved by Robinson in the seventh. Wicke occupied the mound for the Mandarins and pitched a fine game. After the first inning he was never in danger.

### The Game

Silva opened the first inning by reaching first on Haole's error. Shim sacrificed him to second. Kalua drove one out to Robinson at second who relayed to Cockett, nipping Silva at the plate. Kalua and Shim pulled a double steal and got by with it. Enos fled to Chartrand. With two out in the second half of the canto, Robinson singled off Wicke. Cockett was hit by a pitched ball advancing Foster to second. He scored from that station on Palea's safety. Coleman fanned.

### Third Means Three

The fatal third. Ah Tau flew to Robinson. Silva singled, Shim safe on Foster's error. Kalua singled, scoring Silva. Rolph bungled Bal's hit and he was safe, Shim scoring. Kalua caught at plate. Bal scores on passed ball.

Nothing doing then until the fifth canto when the Chinese marshalled forces for a second rally that netted two runs. Silva led off with a three bagger and Shim scored him with a single. Shim stole second. Kalua fanned. Shim stole third and scored on Cockett's error.

### Two More In 7th

Once again were the virtues of the seventh inning proved although Silva leading off probably had something to do with it. He singled. At this stage Robinson relieved Reis on the mound. Reis going to right field and Palea moving in to second. Shim flew to Chartrand. Palea erred putting Kalua on the keystone sack and advancing Silva to third. Kalua pilfered second. Bal singled over Robinson's head and both Kalua and Silva romped home.

Haiku tallied their last counter in the same inning. Rolph slapped one towards third and wound up at second after Ah Leong's error. Souza tried to do likewise but Ah Leong caught him at first. Lefty came to bat with a wicked look in his eye. He doubled and Rolph scored. Robinson drove a wicked liner to left that looked like a sure enough bulls-eye but a beautiful catch ended the rally.

The Chinese threatened in the ninth but nothing came of the attempt. The box score:

## Baseball Magnates Determine on Sked For Island Series

Title play for Maui's baseball championship will commence on Sunday and continue on throughout the County Fair, is the plan under consideration by Managers Rice and Engle of the contending teams, Haiku and the Mandarins.

Under the proposals advanced, the first game of the three game series will be played at the Fair Grounds diamond on Sunday. The second game Thursday morning the first day of the Fair and the third and deciding game, should a third game be needed, on Saturday morning, October 4th. The above outline is still in a tentative stage and depends on whether or not the full teams will be able to turn out on the days mentioned.

Both Teams Confident  
Rice and Engle have both expressed confidence that their respective teams will walk home with the 1922 pennant. Despite the slump in the ranks of the Haiku's that team is regarded the general favorite in the title race. A straightening up of the entire team and a revival of the "do or die" spirit is looked forward to by its backers.

The two recent victories of the Mandarins have given rise to great hopes among that aggregation and they too are confident of capturing the title.

## New Suggestion For Forming Golf Club Appears Workable

New proposals looking to the formation of a golf club and the laying out of a course on Maui were discussed with the editor of Maui News by J. P. Foster of Paia on the Claudine on Friday night. A tentative list of possible members was made out and more than half a hundred possibilities written upon it.

As suggested by Mr. Foster the plan is more feasible than the one for golf links near Wailuku that was considered by the Sports Committee, then the Athletic Committee of the Maui County Fair and Racing Association and abandoned. The site for the links would be up country, in pasture land. The members would raise at the outset through membership fees or subscriptions for one share of stock each a sum sufficient to lay out the course.

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
# Japanese Wrestling Okinawa Inter-Island Championship Bouts AT MAUI COUNTY FAIR
