Maui National Guard On First Encampment Since Close of War

Marking the first activity of its kind since the close of the World War Maui's National Guard left Saturday morning for a 15 day encampment near Makawao. Company D. of Wailuku and Company A. of Lahaina comprise the units taking part in the maneuvers. Under the direction of Captain F. L. Hinton, Wailuku's representation, numbering about 75 men, departed for Camp Farrington with two Browning machine guns and full equipment for operating this branch of the service. Eight mules loaned by the Wailuku Sugar Company and seven horses loaned by the Haleakala ranch are furnishing transportation. At Camp Farrington the local organization was joined by the Lahaina unit, commanded by Captain Sam Mookini. Company A is an infantry outfit and its personnel is practically the same in number as that of the local guard. Officers of the Wailuku Company declared that the 15 days encampment would be made an annual feature of national guard activities. A similar program was in vogue until the entry of the United States into the World War.

Free Lecture Upon Applied Psychology Will Be Offered

Applied psychology will be the subject of a free lecture delivered by Miss Evelyn Whitell at the Grand Hotel at 8 o'clock tomorrow night, a subject which should interest considerable numbers on Maui for when an effort was made to establish a psychological research society it developed that there are a large number who are interested in the subject. Miss Whitell is not lecturing on psychological research which goes into investigation of the causes of phenomena. On the contrary her discourse is on what can be accomplished by the application of psychic powers which in her are highly developed. She has lectured and taught extensively on the Coast and recently in Honolulu. There she delivered two of a course of six lectures and has established classes. Her topics there were "Applied Psychology—the Functioning of the Sub-Conscious Mind—Psycho-analysis" and "Psychology of Health—the foods we eat and how colors affect us." Miss Whitell spoke before the Maui Woman's Club yesterday afternoon and is to speak to one of the other women's organizations today. She is an interesting talker and is understandable to the person who has made no investigations or studies in psychology as well as to the student.

Federal Officials Sanctioned Booze Theft Is Charge

(ASSOCIATED PRESS) WASHINGTON, Sept. 2.—The federal grand jury report, rendered to the court today, declared that "certain unnamed representatives of the department of justice" had withdrawn quantities of seized liquor, which had been stored in Washington in 1920, without due process of law, for the use of themselves and their friends. The report said that the withdrawals had been sanctioned by "those in higher authority." No indictments were returned in the matter, principally because the liquor had not been taken over formally by the government.
