

Gold Bryan Wins In Spectacular 1 1-4 Mile Dash

Honolulu Mare Upsets 'Dope' At Legion Celebration; Track Record for Two Year Olds Broken

Upsetting all "dope" concerning the probable outcome of the track classic at the Legion's Armistice Day celebration, Saturday, John Grace's whirlwind mare, Gold Bryan, ran her way to victory over the favorite, Haleakala, stepping the mile and a quarter distance in the fast time of 2:10.

At no time after the dropping of the flag was the race in doubt, although the McPhee entry held her place of perhaps a half length behind during the entire run. Gold Bryan got away to a flying start with Haleakala close at her heels. Castenny, the third entry, remained with the leaders until the first turn was passed and then steadily lost ground, crossing the finish some lengths behind Haleakala.

In the one-mile race, the eleventh feature of the program, however, the two favorites ran neck and neck for a short distance over a track made wet and slippery by a sudden rain, Haleakala taking a fair lead on the back stretch and romping over the line winner by two lengths or more.

The heavy downpour which began shortly after the kickoff in the Kahului-Paia football game placed the track in a practically useless condition and little in the way of fast time could be expected in the several races which closed the program.

One Record Broken

One record was smashed during the day, however, when Peg O'Punene, running in the three-eighths mile rambler for Hawaiian bred two year olds, against Punene Vamp and Waiiana, ran away from the field and covered the race in 27 3/5 seconds.

The first surprise of the day came when, in the half mile free-for-all, The Sentinel left the flag in a cyclone start and beat Castenny, the favorite for that event. The Sentinel's time was 51 3/5 seconds. Gold Bryan, scheduled to run, scratched.

In the second race for Japanese owned horses, Charlie crossed the line in 58 2/5, defeating Baby, second, and Mongoose.

The Sentinel won her second race for the day in the third event, covering the half mile in 52 seconds, and beating by a fair margin Knight O'Glin and Mohawk Boy who finished in the order named.

Miss von Tempusky Wins

Joe Carey, ridden by Lorna von Tempusky won the half mile ladies race in a walk. Warning Jr., ridden by Inez McPhee, decided the leave the race flat on its back near the last turn and entered the rest of the distance. Miss von Tempusky's time was 26 seconds for the half mile.

Considerable delay was experienced in starting the three-quarter mile Japanese race with Boy, Pep and Nigger remaining together in a group until the finish when the first two led. Time for the race was 1:19 1/5.

The eighth race, with Punene Vamp, The Sentinel, Knight O'Glin and Boy as contestants, over the half mile route for Hawaiian bred animals was accomplished by The Sentinel in 51 4/5 seconds. Knight O'Glin ran second. The four got away to the prettiest start of the day at the drop of the flag.

Whiteface and Grey won first and second in the Japanese owned and ridden, half mile consolation. Time was 50 1/5 seconds. Nigger also ran.

Mohawk Boy won the cowboy race with Joe Carey second, in 55 seconds for the half mile. Happy Boy ran third.

Dora D and Hanale took first and second place for the half mile consolation in 54 1/5 seconds.

The novelty motor vehicle free for all, open to motor trucks of any size, weight or age, was postponed due to the muddy condition of the track.

Grid Teams Play At Lahaina Under Breadfruit Shadow

A rather striking feature of the second game of the senior league football series is that it will be played at Lahaina and in "The Shadow of the Breadfruit."

St. Anthony school turned the tables on the Wailuku public school football eleven when on Friday afternoon at Wells Field the Saints gridiron eleven fell on the school squad for a 24 to 2 victory. The school eleven's only score came by a touchdown in the initial period of the game.

The Saints secured their first touchdown in the same quarter when Sequela broke through the public school team line and dashed 55 yards to the goal posts. The remaining three touchdowns were scored by Benny Durogo. The second score came in the second quarter by an end run and the last two by center rushes in the last stanza.

In their first contest the Saints were defeated by the public school eleven, the score being 9-6. It is expected one more game will be played to decide the championship of the teams.

Maroon Is Victor In First Contest Over Kahului

Kahului Squad Fails To Score While Maroon Piles Up 18 Points—Game Played in Heavy Rain

The Maroon put it over! Scoring touchdowns in the first, second and last quarters the Paia team were victors in the first football game of the senior league by the score of 18 to 0. The Red and Blue were held scoreless and at no time did they seriously threaten the Maroon goal.

The game was played in heavy showers of rain before a crowd of approximately 600 fans. The muddy field made accurate passing and punting practically impossible and on only two occasions were substantial gains made by that method of play. Paia succeeded in two attempts via the air route one resulting in the first touchdown which came early in the first quarter.

The Red and Blue showed weakness both on the offensive and the defensive although their line strength was a great surprise and held wonderfully well. Once only during the game did the Harbor Town eleven make a real gain from scrimmage. They failed to make a first down. In the third quarter the Kahului team showed their fighting spirit. A forward pass by the Maroon placed the ball on the Red and Blue five yard line immediately after the kick off. Two center rushes were made by the Maroon without an inch of gain. A delayed end run was broken up by the Red and Blue resulting in the Maroons loss of eight yards. Again on the fourth down Kahului held and receiving the ball punted out to its own 35 yard line. There was no score made that period.

Coleman again proved the star for the Maroon team. With him and almost as much thrown in the limelight was Foster Robinson. The Maroon's husky fullback, Coleman scored two touchdowns and Robinson the third. At the try for points after touchdown, two drop kicks and one attempted place kick failed.

The Game

Kahului won the toss and chose to kick off. The Maroon attempted line plunges but failed to gain. Then a forward pass put the ball on the Red and Blue 20 yard line. From there Coleman circled the left end and crossed the Kahului goal. The drop kick failed. Score Paia 6, Kahului 0. Kahului again kicked off to the Paia 20. Two plunges failed to gain but a skin tackle play made first down. Coleman was dumped for a loss on a delayed end run. The Maroon punted squarely into a Red and Blue player who for some reason allowed the ball to roll past and Coleman recovered for the Maroon team. Paia penalized for offside.

The Red and Blue gained the ball on a fumble by the Paia center but failed to gain yardage against the Maroon line. Two penalties for offside were imposed on the Kahului team. The first quarter ended with Paia holding the ball on the Red and Blue's 37 yard line.

Second Score

Coleman and Robinson continued to make gains through line and skin tackle plays. Then a run around left end for a 20 yard gain and Coleman scored his second touchdown. A place kick was attempted but failed. Paia 12, Kahului 0.

Paia kicked off and the Red and Blue were again placed on the offensive. Two fumbles brought a loss of several yards to Kahului who then punted out 30 yards to Paia's 45. Frequent fumbles occurred as the rain became heavier. Line plunges by the Maroon squad were blocked and the Maroon punted out to Kahului's 20 yard mark. A forward pass was intercepted by the Maroon just at the whistle. Half time was called with Paia holding the ball on the Red and Blue 15 yard mark.

Last Score

The final touchdown came after Souza had taken the ball around right end to the Red and Blue eleven yard line. Foster gained three yards through the line and on the next play, around right end, the big fellow crossed the Kahului goal. The triple pass back of the line was tried in the point from scrimmage but Kahului broke up the play.

Terrific showers by this time made good play impossible. The last few minutes of the contest was played in Red and Blue territory. A Paia fumble shortly before the whistle blew saved the Red and Blue from further score.

Air Route Wins Game For Kams

(ASSOCIATED PRESS) HONOLULU, Nov. 13.—By defeating McKinley to the tune of 20 to 0, Kamehameha has practically cinched the interscholastic grid title here. The Honolulu Military Academy is the only remaining team that may prove a stumbling block in the path of the Kams although the cadets are not considered serious obstacles.

The forward pass played an important part in the Kam's victory Saturday afternoon at Kam field. The first score came but a few moments before the whistle ending the first half. The second touchdown came in the third period and the final tally in the last quarter, both the result of forward passes.

Two attempts at the try for points after touchdown were successful.

ARMY HELD DOWN

Buff and Blue Is Walloped by Saints

Punahou scored a field goal in the first quarter but the Saints retaliated with a touchdown, and, failing to convert the try for point the score then remained the same during the rest of the game.

The game opened up with hard play and the Buff and Blue succeeded in placing the ball on the Saints' twenty yard line. A forward pass failed and Fernandez dropped back to the 28 yard mark and booted a beautiful drop kick squarely between the Saints goal posts.

The Saints came back strong, three direct line plunges placing the ball on the Punahou one yard line. Punahou stiffened and for two downs held but on the third plunge Blaisdell went across for the only touchdown of the day.

OAHU COLLEGE VICTOR
