

LOCAL NEWS.

No. 96. Robert D. Stillman, complainant, vs. The Hudson Bridge Company at Albany; and No. 97. Frederick W. Coleman, complainant, vs. The Hudson Bridge Company at Albany. The argument of this cause was concluded by Mr. Reverdy Johnson for the complainant. Adjourned until Monday, 11 o'clock.

CRIMINAL COURT.—After our report closed yesterday, the jury in the case of Henry Wilson returned a verdict of not guilty. James Boyle was then tried, and found guilty of the pious act of stealing prayer-books from St. Matthew's church. He was sentenced to six months imprisonment in jail.

George Rawlings, charged with stealing a lot of horse shoes and other articles, from John Duval, was found not guilty.

Michael Leubady, indicted for the same offence, was found guilty of stealing thirty horse shoes, of the value of three dollars, and sentenced to ten months in jail.

To-day, Charles Bond, negro, convicted of assault and battery, was sentenced to pay a fine of \$10 and costs.

Francis Miller, a seaman, was then placed on trial, for an assault and battery with intent to kill Officer Thomas, of Georgetown, and found not guilty.

Wm. N. Adams, negro, was then placed on trial, for stealing a trunk and other articles from Joseph M. Kennedy. He was found guilty, and sentenced to jail for one year.

Mr. Lassie, a French gentleman, now on a visit to this country, will exhibit a small model of a balloon, invented and constructed by him, in the hall of the Patent Office, on Monday next, the 17th, at 2 o'clock. The balloon differs from other constructions of this sort, in that it enables the aeronaut to propel his vessel through the atmosphere in any direction, and with certainty and safety.

FIGHT AT THE KIRKWOOD HOUSE.—About eight last night, a fight occurred at the Kirkwood House, between a white man and an Indian. During the row, the latter received a blow which brought him to the floor. Serious results might have ensued, had not the parties been separated by the bystanders.

SENATOR TOOMBS'S PROPOSITION.
Augusta, Dec. 15, 1860.—It is understood that Senator Toombs is about leaving for Washington. He has just published a letter referring to the fifth article of the Constitution; and says, if the Constitution be amended, the amendments should be such as could never be evaded or resisted by abolition States, and should give full and ample security to Southern rights. Then, if the Republican party will vote for amendments, or even a majority vote, in good faith, they can easily be carried through Congress; and then thinks it would be reasonable and fair to postpone the final action until the Legislatures of Northern States could be consistently called together for definite action on the amendments.

If the Northern States refuse, he urges Georgia to secede at the latest day, say March 4th.
