THE ROBBERY OF THE INTERIOR DEPARTMENT.

Further Particulars.—The Arrest of Russell.

As we stated in our last issue would be the case, Detective Officer Allen arrived here on Tuesday morning, from New York, accompanied by Officer Doudegan, one of Marshal Rynder's aids, and bringing in custody William H. Russell. Officer Allen left this city at three o'clock Saturday afternoon, with one of his partners, (Officer Busher), whom he left in Baltimore on other business, and proceeded immediately through to New York. He had information that a person was dispatched on the same train, to notify Russell of his coming, as soon as he arrived in New York, but managed to head off the messenger. Allen went directly to Marshal Rynder for assistance. The Marshal did not know Russell, or where he stopped, but from the first assisted Allen to the best of his ability.

Allen went to the post office with Rynders, and there ascertained where the pony express office is located. Allen then went to the express office, leaving Rynders (who would be recognized) on the opposite corner, and inquiring for Mr. Russell, said he had a package to deliver to him in person. The clerk replied that Mr. R. was not in, but was boarding at the Everett House. Allen went there, and ascertained that he had taken breakfast two hours earlier than usual that morning, (Monday.) Returning to the marshal's office, Allen got the assistance of one of the marshal's aids, and returned to the pony express office, where he found Russell, arrested him, carried him to the office of Marshal Rynders, and delivered him into his custody. Russell was then taken before Judge Betts, who remanded him to the custody of Allen, to be taken to Washington for trial.

When arrested, Russell appeared to be momentarily excited, but it soon vanished, and he told Officer Allen that he knew he was in New York after him, and had been informed of that morning. Upon his arrival here, he was taken to the residence of Captain Goddard, who issued the warrant for his arrest, and thence to jail, where he was committed for a further hearing. On Tuesday afternoon the further hearing was had in the guard room of the jail, before Justice Goddard—District Attorney Ould appearing for the Government, and Messrs. Davidge, Chilton, and Humphrey Marshall, of Kentucky, for the defence, assisted by several legal advisers, friends of the prisoner. It resulted in a demand of \$500,000 bail, which not being given, Mr. R. was placed in custody of the marshal of the District, to be retained for trial at the Criminal Court.

There were numerous prominent gentlemen at the jail in addition to the counsel employed in the case—among others, Senator Green of Missouri, Hon. Marcus Parrott of Kansas, R. W. Latham of this city, and Mr. Lea, of the firm of Suter, Lea, & Co., bankers in this city. Shortly after Mr. Russell had been placed in custody of Marshal Selden, he obtained permission from the District Attorney to go to his private house in the first ward, whether he went in charge of Deputy Marshal Phillips, and remained in consultation with several friends until about half past one o'clock, P. M., when he was again conveyed to the jail. He occupies at present the office of Jailor King, and was visited there to-day by a number of friends.

It is stated that the abstraction of the bonds was known as long ago as Thursday last, it having been at that time communicated by Bailey to Secretary Floyd. Bailey asked the advice of the latter. Secretary Floyd replied that he had no advice to give, but that on Secretary Thompson's return the matter should be thoroughly investigated. Bailey confessed the whole matter to Secretary Thompson, alleging that he had been led into the commission of the larceny through a desire to save the honor of Mr. Floyd, whose acceptance to a large amount in possession of Mr. Russell, of the firm of Russell, Majors, & Co., Government contractors, would otherwise have been dishonored, he (Bailey) apprehended. These "acceptances," it appears, are simply memoranda of the amounts which would be due at certain periods to Russell, provided he executed his contracts with the Government, and invoked no liability whatever, they being given to enable him to obtain credit. The records, it is alleged, prove that the existence of these acceptances was unknown to Bailey at the period of the first abstraction of bonds, and that his excuse in reference to Mr. Floyd is merely a subterfuge. Russell asked for these acceptances to show his creditors, to satisfy them of his resources. Similar memoranda have been given to public contractors for several years past.

Those who profess to know the facts in the case say that Mr. Russell, who has been largely engaged in transporting United States stores across the Plains to Utah and beyond, finding himself financially embarrassed more than a year ago, obtained the consent of the Secretary of War to draw upon his Department to the amount of \$100,000. The Secretary accepted the draft. Some time afterwards he made a similar request for the same amount, assuring the Secretary that the first draft was taken care of, and the latter supposing that at no time did his obligations amount to over \$100,000.

Mr. Kelly, Chief Clerk of the Interior Department, is now in New York for the purpose of hunting up the missing bonds, and identifying them. The list of bonds missing, as far as can be ascertained, and now believed to be correct, is:

Missouri 6 per cent. coupon bonds - \$370,000

North Carolina 6 per cent. coupon bonds - 357,000

Tennessee 6 per cent. coupon bonds 144,000

The securities of Mr. Bailey gave him up yesterday morning, and he is now in the custody of the marshal.

Mr. Russell was brought before the court yesterday, and it was decided to admit him to bail in the sum of \$500,000, of which sum \$200,000 was accepted from beyond the jurisdiction of the court, and Senator Green, Rep-

representatives Woodson and Barrett, of Missouri, entered into that amount. The other \$300,000 will probably be made up by citizens of Washington.

The alleged acceptance of Secretary Floyd appear, from the evidence, to have been mere memoranda, (as had been customary in the Government Departments), that, at such times as specified, certain amounts would become due under the existing contract with Russell, Majors, & Co.; and these, it appears, Russell had been in the habit of using as collaterals to raise money upon.

CHRISTMAS IN WASHINGTON AND ITS VICINITY.—It cannot be said of Christmas, as was generally remarked of Thanksgiving day, that it was the most quiet holiday we have had for a considerable time. Although many portions of our city enjoyed an entire exemption from riot and fracas, yet in others, and particularly in the eastern portion of the city, there was much rioting and disorder. Elsewhere in to-day's paper will be found full reports of these riots.

The central portion of the city, which is generally more disorderly on holidays than any other portion, seemed this time to be entirely exempt from disturbance.

Long before daybreak, large crowds might have been seen wending their way to the various Catholic and Episcopal churches that were then open for worship. The services at these places were in all cases of the most interesting character, and were very largely attended, most of the churches which were open, even at that hour, being crowded. At St. Matthew's church, high mass was celebrated at eleven o'clock in the morning. Dr. White preached from the first chapter of St. John. The choir, under the leadership of Mr. Chinchilla, performed the sixteenth grand mass of Haydn with full orchestra.

Many took up a good portion of the day in calling on their friends, taking presents with them for the young folks, and partaking of the good things that awaited them. Young America, as usual, was desirous of seeing how many fire crackers each could send off in the briefest space of time—in which delightful proceeding we frequently observed old America taking a hand.

Santa Klaus—Lammond says his name is "Kris Kringle," and we dare say Lammond knows best—was about the night before, scattering beautiful presents among the little folks with a lavish hand, making us wish that we too had hung up our stockings so as to receive a share of the good things. Well, it's all over now, but we are in hopes we will not forget it next time.

Many brilliant parties came off at night, and the fun was kept up till a late hour on all sides.

The Alexandria folks went right into the "spirit" of the thing. Everybody was jolly, and yet everybody was orderly. The boys kept up a continual noise with their fire-crackers, torpedoes, and other light ammunition, and the folks kept things a-going in "the variety of ways peculiar to this old burg. The police had scarcely any arrests to make, as fun and jollity were not supposed to constitute disorderly conduct. At Green's Mansion House, a table was spread, the whole length of the dining room, the entire day, and every one was privileged to eat as much as he desired; an act to be heartily commended.

The Georgetown folks were not at all behind in their observance of this time-honored festival.

We met some folks on Bridge street, however, who seemed to have gone into the "spirit" of the thing a little too deeply, as the color of their noses and the appearance of one of their eyes seemed to indicate. We hear of a little fracas which occurred on Bridge street, a couple of squares above the bridge, about two o'clock in the afternoon, in which a few rather stiff blows were given and received. But these were more like the exceptions to the rule; for Georgetown, taken as a whole, spent the day in a remarkably quiet, and, at the same time in a remarkably pleasant, way. One of our reporters spent a portion of the day in town, and he tells us that he was very loth indeed to leave it.

Well; Christmas is over, and the holidays are fairly upon us. We readers of a merry Christmas, and we hope all our readers did the same; and we hope the pleasures may continue throughout all the holidays.

SWINDLING.—On Monday evening, a gentleman apparently some forty or fifty years of age entered the jewelry store of Mr. H. Semken for the purpose of buying some presents for his son. After examining several watches and other articles, he requested that some of the watches be laid by, and he would return in the morning to see how they ran.

On Tuesday morning, he again made his appearance, and stated that he had been to the Bank of the Metropolis, which he had found closed, and was not able to get his money. He stopped some time, and spoke of several of our high-standing business men, among them Mr. George Parker, of whom he said he had rented a house on C street. He asked also if his friend Mr. Boteler did not often furnish houses complete, and thought it would be less trouble to buy his furniture here than to bring it from Philadelphia. He stated that he was stopping at the National Hotel, and that his name was A. M. Wainright. He then looked at the watches, and made choice of one at 142 dollars, and one at 132 dollars.

He also concluded to take a diamond cluster pin at 126 dollars, making a bill of 400 dollars, for which he asked Mr. S. if his check would not do, as it was impossible for him to get the money from the bank on that day, and he was very anxious to make his son a Christmas present. Mr. S. handed him a blank check, which he filled up and signed, and then took his leave.

This morning the check was presented at the bank, when it was found that no account was kept in the name of Wainright. On inquiry at the National, it was ascertained that the so-called Wainright left at noon on Tuesday.

Officers are on the alert, and no doubt we will be able to see his handsome face at the next Criminal Court. It is supposed that this gentleman is the celebrated bigamist, Haines.

RIOTS IN THE SIXTH WARD.—The sixth ward was the scene of several disgraceful fights on Christmas day. About twelve o'clock on that day several young men, said to be from the Northern Liberties, got into a row among themselves, near the corner of G and Seventh streets.

Mr. William Andrews, observing them beating one of their own number, went up to them for the purpose of making peace, when the whole party turned upon him with stones and other missiles, beating him severely.

At the same place, some three hours later in the day, thirty or forty young men were gathered, making a disturbance, when Officer Geo. Thompson, passing along, ordered them to disperse, which they refused to do, and replied in rather impolite language. Thompson arrested Timothy Mullen, and threatened to take him to the station-house. Mullen resisted, and is said to have had the officer by the throat. The crowd then made a rally to his rescue, knocking the officer down several times. By this time reinforcements arrived, and the tumult became very exciting, many striking right and left with clubs and other missiles, bludgeoning and firing pistols. Thompson, finding the crowd gaining on him, drew a pistol and

fired several shots, as he says, to intimidate the crowd. Timothy Mullen received three or four balls in his knee joint. Dr. McKim is attending the wounded man, who is at the Infirmary, and thinks the wound quite serious. Fears are entertained that the limb will have to be amputated. Mr. George Miller, who had been summoned by the officer to aid in quelling the riot, was struck in the eye, and wounded on the hand by a slung-shot.

Another affray occurred about four o'clock at the same place, between a party of Baltimoreans and some young men of that neighborhood. John Williams, who had his head cut, is the only one we hear of having received any injury at this time.

We may add, that Officer Thompson has made a statement, under oath, in regard to his participation in the affray, in which he says that only two balls were fired.

RUNAWAY.—Yesterday, a little before noon, a horse and buggy, containing two gentlemen, came dashing down Tenth street, towards the avenue. In turning the corner, the buggy was upset, throwing the occupants out, happily without doing them serious injury.

FIGHT ON CAPITOL HILL.—A row occurred at the corner of Fourth street east and C street, Capitol Hill, on Christmas day. The only damage done was a knock down or two, and about the same number of dark-colored eyes.

ESCAPED FROM THE PENITENTIARY.—Yesterday morning, a man named Wells, who was about twelve years ago confined in the penitentiary for the murder of a boy at the Navy Yard, and who was employed as a baker for the establishment, made his escape by climbing over the wall. The sentence of Wells was confinement for life, and his conduct hitherto has been among the very best of any of the prisoners confined in the penitentiary; but who would not embrace any opportunity to escape, rather than to rot in the confinement of a convict's cell? The officers are on the alert, and it is possible they may shortly catch the fugitive.

THE GODDESS OF FREEDOM.—Clark Mills is busily engaged on Crawford's colossal statue of the Goddess of Freedom, intended for the dome of the Capitol. The material used is bronze, composed of one ounce of block tin and half an ounce of zinc to every pound of copper. A section of the statue comprising the shoulders and breast, and the arms down to the elbow, has lately been cast, and is the largest complex piece ever made by Mr. Mills. The whole statue will weigh, when completed, 17,000 pounds.

WEDDING AT THE SIXTH PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH.—A large number of ladies and gentlemen were present at the Sixth Presbyterian Church on Tuesday afternoon, to witness the marriage of Mr. Francis M. Bradley to Miss Helen Hazard. The ceremony was performed by the pastor, Rev. Mason Noble, the choir singing a beautiful anthem. After the service was over, their many friends crowded around them to extend their congratulations to the newly married couple.

THE BALLOON PEDLAR ASSAULTED.—Yesterday, about noon, as James Sanders, a German and pedlar of the children's balloons now all the rage with young America, was going past the National Hotel, endeavoring to dispose of his wares, he was set upon by two intoxicated men, George Milan and Thomas Rock, who cut several of his balloons loose. When the pedlar endeavored to protect himself, one of them struck him with a stick, applying the epithet of d—d Black Republican and other equally respectable phrases to him. They were arrested by Officer William Horner, and taken before Justice Donn, who ordered them to pay a fine of \$3.94 each, and to give \$100 security each, to keep the peace for six months. They were very unruly in the office of the Justice, making all sorts of threats, and swearing at everybody in general and the pedlar in particular.

ROBBERY OF A STORE.—About twelve o'clock M., yesterday, some person or persons broke into the grocery store of Mr. William R. Chesney, in Seventh street, and abstracted a gold watch that had been left there by the proprietor, who, shortly previous, had left the store to take a ride in the country.

FIRE IN GEORGETOWN.—On Monday evening, about sundown, a small frame stable in the rear of Mr. A. D. Shekell's residence, on High street, caught fire, and was entirely consumed. There was no alarm, and the engines were not out. It was the work of an incendiary.

ARREST.—On Tuesday morning, W. L. King was taken before Justice Clark, at the guard-house, upon a charge of setting fire to a house situated in the alley between Twelfth and Thirteenth and E and F streets, in the second ward. Watchman Hudson alleged that the prisoner had been suspected before, and upon this occasion, he was closely watched by the witness, who saw him take out the matches and set fire to the house. King was committed to jail for court.

IS LUCK.—On Monday last, among the presents given to purchasers at Evans's Gift Book store were two gold watches, one worth \$65, and one \$40, and one silver watch, worth \$15; the first, by a gentleman residing on Tenth street, near the avenue; the second, by Mr. Hughes, of Loudoun, Va.; and the last, by a lady. A fine gold chain, worth \$20, was also drawn by Mrs. Crillian, Bladensburg.
