

MEETING OF CONGRESS.

The Senate was called to order at 12 o'clock, by the Vice President of the United States. Forty-three Senators were present, viz: Messrs. Allen, Archer, Ashley, Aitchison, Atherton, Bagby, Benton, Breese, Cameron, Cass, T. Clayton, J. M. Clayton, Chalmers, Colquitt, Corwin, Crittenden, Dayton, Davis, Dix, Evans, Fairfield, Greene, Hannegan, Haywood, Huntington, Johnson, of Md., Johnson, of La., Jennings, Lewis, Levy, McDuffie, Mangum, Miller, Niles, Phelps, Semple, Sevier, Simmons, Speight, Sturgeon, Turney, Upham, Wescott.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

At twelve o'clock the House was called to order by Mr. French, the Clerk of the last House of Representatives. Two hundred and twelve members answered to their names. The House then went into an election (viva voce) for Speaker, Messrs. R. Smith, Severance and Cobb, acting as Tellers; the following is the result: John W. Davis, 120; Samuel F. Vinton, 72; M. Norris, jr., 8; W. S. Miller, 5; R. C. Winthrop, 1; J. G. Chapman, 1; J. H. Campbell, 1; D. M. Barringer, 1; Andrew Stewart, 1.

Mr. Davis was conducted to his seat by Mr. Vinton, and made a short and highly appropriate speech. The members present were then duly sworn by the Speaker elect, and took their seats.

Mr. Thompson moved that the Senate be informed, by the Clerk, that a quorum of the House were present, and had elected the Hon. John W. Davis, of Indiana, their Speaker—which was adopted.

On motion of Mr. McDowell, a joint committee was ordered, to wait upon the President, and inform him that the House were ready to receive any communication he might choose to make.

Mr. McDowell also moved that the rules of the last House be adopted.

Mr. Hamlin wished to amend so as to abolish the hour rule, so called.

Amendments to the amendment were offered by Messrs. Payne and McClernand, upon which a brief, but exceedingly interesting debate sprang up, which was participated in by Messrs. Payne, Hamlin, McClernand, Winthrop, Chipman, and others.

The House refused to strike out the rule admitting abolition petitions, and then, on motion of Mr. Holmes, it was resolved that the rules of the last House be adopted for the present, and that a committee be appointed to report on the same.

The Preparatory Department provides for instruction in all the branches of a thorough English business education, in addition to the Elements of the Mathematics and Classical Literature. The College course is arranged in the four classes usual in the institutions of this country. The government of the students is as energetic as their circumstances seem to require. They attend at least two recitations a day, and the Faculty contemplate increasing them to three, Church and Bible Class on the Sabbath, and are visited in their rooms so frequently as to preclude the danger of any great irregularities. It is believed no institution in the United States has more exemplary young men in connexion with it. They are all required to lodge in the College edifice, special cases excepted. The annual expenses are—for board, tuition and room rent, during the winter session \$61 1-2; for the summer session, \$41 87 1-2; washing, \$10; wood, \$3 00. Total expense, \$116 75. Boarding can be had in town at \$1 25 per week. There are two vacations in the year, commencing on the third Thursdays of April and September; each of five weeks continuance. The summer session will commence on Thursday, the 23d of May. The annual commencement takes place on the third Thursday in September. The Trustees have recently made various arrangements which will increase the efficiency of the Institution. They have increased the number of Professors and provided for the most ample instruction of the students. Professor Baugher and Hautp are prepared to board boys and to exercise a special supervision over their studies and deportment, and Parents who may prefer placing their sons under their care, will be secure in regard to their proper management, under arrangements such as pertain to the family circle.
