IMPERATIVE FUNERAL SERVICES—A BAPTIST AND A FUNERAL IN THE SAME HOUR—AN OUTSPOKEN SERMON—INDIGNATION MEETING CALLED.

The scenes witnessed yesterday at the residence of Mr. James Smith Miller, where lay all that was mortal of Mary E. Pomeroy, will not be forgotten within the lifetime of those whose unpleasant lot it was to witness them.

The funeral was such as has not been witnessed in Jersey City for many years. Men of high standing in the community, who were not acquainted with the deceased or with the family with whom she resided, were there, not from curiosity but to record a protest against

that sent her into an early grave. The hour for the services was fixed at 2 o'clock, but from noon the house was crowded.

Members of respectable families were packed in the house of mourning, though the weather was not so favorable.

Among those present were: Ex-Mayor Sawyer and lady, Charles L. Northrup, Alderman Tolley, George P. Howell, an elder of Glendening's church; William E. Dudley, J. A. Glendening, John H. Bell, Clinton W. Guizar, Frank Kimberley, George E. Randall, Charles W. Serrill, S. H. Demotte, John Allen and Gilbert B. Dudley.

Ex-Mayor Sawyer was especially expressive of indignation. I should count myself an honor, as a man of family I want to show my appreciation of the sterling character

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Letter from Mr. S. Townsend.

For the Delaware Gazette.

PUNYNESS, August 21, 1874.

Mr. Editor: I have your issue of the 15th instant, I believe, there was a proposition from Dr. Worrell, of Delaware city,

that the Chairman of the County Executive Committee call the Delegates that was appointed by this county to the State Convention together, to try to agree on one candidate for Governor from this county.

Hearing this proposed calling the State Delegates together by a County Committee turned about for some time, and with the unaided meeting of said Executive Committee twice, once at Wilmington and once at Middletown, before the meeting of the State Convention, naturally many men who have had experience in politics suspicious.

Therefore, as soon as Dr. Worrell made the proposition in the papers I opposed it and also stated that I supposed some other part of the county would be in favor of the movement than Red Lion hundred; and as Dr. Worrell denies being in the interests of those who were intriguing for that call, I accept his denial, but put this question to our candidates for the Convention together, to try to agree on one candidate for Governor from this county.

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
