BLAND'S SILVER BILL.

Many persons have not read the bill which Mr. Bland, of Missouri, offered in the House last winter...

But to say that we lament the loss of Mr. Williams' vote on the Bland Silver bill, and that therefore, the GAZETTE would read him or any one else out of the Democratic party, is as illogical as it is baseless.

The repeal of the resumption law passed by the Radical Congress, was a measure that was thoroughly discussed in all the States during the last campaign and the Democratic party had pledged itself to its repeal.

Congress was not in session Saturday, both house having adjourned from Friday until to day. It is expected that the case of Hon. J. B. Eustis claiming a seat in the Senate, from Louisiana, will be called up to day, and speedily disposed of, as the silver bill has been made the special order for to-morrow.

THE SILVER BILL AGAIN.

The silver bill introduced by Mr. Stanley Matthews, on the heels of the message of Mr. Hayes, is a very large and important preamble to a very small amount of bill. The proposition is about three to one; and it seems as though it was to exploit the "breast" that he introduced the "Be it enacted" clause.

That is not true. When silver is made a legal tender it will be equal to what it was before the war.

SILVER ON THE BRAIN—REPUTATION.

Scarcely a paper published but recently has had something derogatory to say about the "infamous silver bill," and its de and demonization, and why should not we indulge in it?
