LI. W. H. WINTERS, A. A. Q. M. at Camp Bowie, made a hasty business call at Tucson this week. He started on his return Thursday and will proceed to Washington, and may not return for several months. Lieut. O'Connor will temporarily act as A. A. Q. M. at that post.

The party left for Crittenden on Wednesday, and are expected back to-day, after which they will proceed to Camp Grant.

HARRY M. SMITH, captain of company G, 21st Infantry, arrived in Tucson last Monday, with a lot of recruits. He left San Francisco with 140 on Sept. 5, per steamer via the mouth of the Colorado, and thence to Ft. Yuma by river steamer, and reached the latter place Sept. 12. Private John Murphy died near Guaymas, and 3 men deserted en route. At Yuma, he turned 66 over to Lt. Sherwood for camps Date-creek, Hualpai, Verde, and Mohave; and 11 at Maricopa Wells to Lt. J. M. Ross for E. Troop 1st cav. at McDowell. Thirty are assigned to camp Thomas, 17 to Grant, 19 to Bowie and 5 to Crittenden.

DISTRICT COURT PROCEEDINGS.—The October term of the Court of the first District, opened Monday, October 3d. The Grand Jury was impaneled, sworn, and charged the same day, and continued its labors until Saturday last, when it was finally discharged, having found nine indictments of which three were for murder.

Tuesday last, David Anderson was convicted of grand larceny, committed last July in Tucson. He stole a \$200 check and some cash from John Dilger, a discharged soldier.

Jose Maria Ramirez, pleaded guilty to the charge of an assault with deadly weapon with intent to commit bodily injury upon Librado Migrero, June 24, in Tucson.

On Wednesday, Joseph Carrillo was convicted of burglary, he having entered the hotel of Levin and Brichta, in Tucson, in the night of August 22, and stolen a watch and chain, and pocket book containing money and other valuables, belonging to Daniel H. Stickney.

Anthony Dorman, indicted for the murder of Felipe Garcia, pleaded not guilty. Trial set for November 21st to give time to obtain witnesses. Thos. P. Duffey was assigned for the defense.

On Thursday, David Anderson was sentenced to 17 months in the Territorial prison; J. M. Ramirez to 3 months, and Joseph Carrillo to two years, with costs of prosecution taxed against the prisoners in each case.

DERIVED last week a train load of 70,000 pounds of government freight was delivered to the A. Q. M. at this depot, which left San Francisco at the same time that a large amount of government supplies for this place was shipped via Guaymas, which has not yet been heard from, but are supposed to be en route in charge of a gentleman who is bending his best energies to demonstrate the superiority of that route; but it is a failure and nothing else can be made of it.

Governor's Apportionment Proclamation.

To All Whom it May Concern: Whereas, Under an Act of the Congress of the United States, entitled, "An Act to confirm the apportionment and amend certain laws of the Territory of Arizona," approved March 23, 1870, it is provided that an election shall be held in said Territory on the Tuesday after the first Monday in November, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy; and

Whereas, It is made the duty of the Governor, by said Act, to declare by proclamation, at least two months previous to said election, the number of members of each branch of the Legislature to which each county or district of said Territory shall be entitled.

Now, therefore, in pursuance of the duty so enjoined upon me, I, A. P. K. Safford, Governor of the Territory of Arizona, do hereby proclaim the following apportionment of members to the ensuing Legislative Assembly to which each county or district is entitled, viz:

The County of Pima, four (4) Members of the Council and eight (8) Members of the House.

The County of Yuma, one (1) Member of the Council, and three (3) Members of the House.

The Counties of Mohave and Pah Ute together, one (1) Member of the Council and one (1) Member of the House.

The County of Yavapai, three (3) Members of the Council and six (6) Members of the House.

Given under my hand, and the Great Seal of the said Territory, at [L. A.] Tucson, this seventh day of September, A. D. 1870.

Governor's Election Proclamation.

Whereas, under an Act of the Congress of the United States, entitled "An Act to confirm the apportionment and amend certain laws of the Territory of Arizona," approved March 23, 1870, it is provided that there shall be held, throughout the Territory, on the Tuesday after the first Monday in November, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy, an election for members of the next Legislative Assembly, and for all Township, County, and District officers, and for Delegates to the Forty-Second Congress of the United States; and

Whereas, It is further provided in said Act that it shall be the duty of the Governor to order such election by proclamation to be issued not less than two months previous to said day.

Now, therefore, I, A. P. K. Safford, Governor of the Territory of Arizona, in pursuance of the duty enjoined upon me, do hereby order a General Election to be held upon the day prescribed in said Act, to-wit: November 8, 1870, and also designate the following offices to be filled at said election, viz:

A Delegate to the Forty-Second Congress of the United States.

Nine (9) Members of the Territorial council, and eighteen (18) Members of the Territorial House of Representatives, as follows:

The County of Pima, four (4) Members of the Council and eight (8) Members of the House.

The County of Yuma, one (1) Member of the Council and three (3) Members of the House.

The Counties of Mohave and Pah Ute combined, one (1) Member of the Council, and one (1) Member of the House.

The County of Yavapai, three (3) Members of the Council and six (6) Members of the House.

Also, in each county, three (3) Supervisors, a Sheriff, District Attorney, County Recorder, County Treasurer, County Surveyor, two (2) Coroners, and a Public Administrator.

Also, in each Election Precinct, in each of said counties one and not more than two (2) Constables, and two (2) Justices of the Peace; and in each such Precinct containing a population of more than eight hundred persons, to be ascertained by the Probate Court, one additional Justice of the Peace.

Given under my hand, and the Great Seal of said Territory at Tucson, [L.S.] this Seventh day of September, A. D. 1870.
