FRIGHT FOR ARIZONA.—The S. D. Union of the 2d says some 14,000 pounds of freight left for Tucson during the week, but does not state who for.

UNDER the tri-weekly arrangement, the stages for Tucson leave San Diego Monday, Wednesday and Friday mornings.

CAPT. C. E. MOWRY arrived from Guaymas last Saturday. Fourteen wagons laden with government stores followed him, and are due here inside of ten days.

BEN C. TRUMAN, of The San Diego Bulletin will please accept our hearty thanks for a lengthy account of the capitulation of Paris, in a proof-sheet of matter for The Bulletin of Feb. 4, although we received the same news in The Los Angeles Star by the same mail.

THE first tri-weekly mail leaves here for the west at 3 p. m. next Monday, and will arrive early Wednesday morning. Every preparation being made complete, the tri-weekly will run regularly thereafter, and the accommodations on the entire line are equal to any interior stage route. Stages twice a week, and buck-board once.

COL. BERNARD and family, and his Troop of the First Cavalry, and 2d Lieut. Kyle, arrived in Tucson this week, en route to San Francisco in pursuance of orders. The Colonel has for several months been in command at Camp Bowie, and has made a good record in Arizona.

Why does the Arizona mail from San Francisco come in batches of once a week, when there is an overland daily mail from that city to San Diego? Does the Bay City P. M. permit our mail to lie there for six days at a time to be sent exclusively by steamer? And if so, why? Our California exchanges will oblige by re-printing this.

LIEUT. CUSHING, with Lieut. Bourke and a detachment of cavalry, left Tuesday last on the trail of the Indians who stole Capt. Gay's and others cattle from Linn's ranch last Saturday. He had previously ascertained that the trail led to the mountains south-east of town. The military authorities often complain that citizens are not always prompt in reporting depredations, as in this case.

A SOCIAL PARTY comes off at Congress Hall next Tuesday evening, and we are informed by the managers that it is complimentary to the members of the Legislature. Nearly two hundred invitations have been extended, and liberal preparations are in progress to make it one of the most complete and enjoyable ever given in Tucson. The following members of the invitation committee have tickets for sale at their places of business: Chas. H. Lord, M. Jacobs, E. N. Fish and Jas. H. Toole.

**From Wickenburg.**

Hon. J. H. Fitzgerald gives us the following items, received in a letter from Wickenburg dated Jan. 29th: The Vulture Co. have struck an unusually rich body of ore in their lower level, and everything was lovely with the company's affairs as usual. Mr. Wilson has commenced work on the eastern extension of the Vulture mine, and contemplates reducing the ore at the 'little mill'. It was reported that some miners were making \$10 to \$15 per day with rockers, in the Bradshaw Mt. placers, and that a number of men were awaiting the Spring thaw with a view to an advance in force on those diggings.

ANTHONY DORMAN, whose execution for the murder of Felipe Garcia, last June, was set for yesterday, will have a year or more of life so far as the law is concerned. Some kind hearted men have raised a purse, procured the legal services of Hon. Coles Bashford, made an application to chief justice Titus for an appeal of the case, and had it granted on the 9th instant. On the first Monday in January, 1872, the Supreme court convenes, and then the case will be reviewed, and if any error of the law be found to have been committed on the trial, a new trial will be ordered, and if none, the execution will be commanded and a day named for it. The legal right to this proceeding is not questioned by any intelligent man, but the policy and justice of it are by many very good men. This appeal seems not to be sought in defence of murder nor to shield one guilty of it from any punishment, but rather against capital punishment. This being the case, the excellent gentlemen procuring it, would appear more consistent and perhaps exhibit higher regard for the public welfare, by simultaneously pressing a repeal of the law inflicting the death penalty. The Legislature is now in session, and will not be again for two years. If the death penalty cannot be inflicted in Arizona, let the cumbersome statute imposing it be repealed, and courts and juries be relieved of the farce of finding such verdicts. It is not denied nor was it in evidence that the prisoner Dorman is not guilty of the unprovoked and inexcusable murder of a well behaved man, and it will indeed be a perilous precedent to establish that drunkenness is an excuse or palliation of murder. We have great regard for those who so deeply sympathize with the guilty man in this case, but we have no less esteem for those who feel that their sympathy may have blunted their judgment, and that they are pleading for mercy at the expense of justice, and for one who failed to show either.

DEPUTY U. S. Surveyor Foreman has completed a line to the Mexican boundary, and returned on last Wednesday. He speaks in the highest praise of the richness of the Santa Cruz and other valleys and sections between Tucson and our southern border; says the soil is extraordinarily rich, the Santa Cruz a large, rapid stream, and that it has many tributaries winding through valuable timber, grazing and agricultural lands. In this attractive section, four or more men armed with revolvers accompany one team when plowing, and the plow is adorned with a gun strapped to it. Every house is of necessity a fort, and also all corrals. With the utmost precaution, stock is frequently stolen and the scores of graves attest the fell work of the Savage, yet the desirableness of those lands induce men to peril their lives for homes thereon. In face of these facts, it is charged that men only stay in Arizona for government pickings. What contemptible and unjust charges these are, need not be specifically defined. Mr. Foreman finds the distance in a direct line from Tucson to the boundary, to be between 61 and 62 miles. He says the monument near the Sonora road has been nearly destroyed. The guilty parties would, if legally dealt with, be in a penitentiary.

MAJOR E. A. EVANS, passed through Tucson lately on his way to take command of Camp Bowie. The Major formerly commanded Camp Rawlins and also Hualpai. He is an old army officer, and is in fact Major of the Third Cavalry. Surgeon Soule accompanied Major Evans from Prescott, and is on his way to Camp Thomas where he is assigned. He is now awaiting the arrival of recruits for Thomas who are due here.

MR. ZECKENDORF quite brilliantly celebrated the capitulation of Paris, on Tuesday evening. Bonfires, cannon firing, &c. constituted the programme.

A GONZALES, shot last week by Frank Griffin for an Apache on an Indian scout, is reported in easy condition and liable to recover.

YOU ARE HEREBY SUMMONED AND required to appear in an action brought against you by the above named plaintiff, in the District Court of the First Judicial District of the Territory of Arizona, and to answer the complaint therein, filed in the office of the Clerk of said Court at Tucson, in the County of Pima, within twenty days (exclusive of the day of service) after service of this summons upon you, if served within this county; if served out of this county, but within this District, thirty days; in all other cases, forty days.

The said action is brought to obtain a decree of Court for the foreclosure of a certain mortgage described in the said complaint, and executed by the said Hilario Cuevas to John B. Allen, to secure the payment of the sum of Nine Thousand Dollars in gold coin with the interest thereon, payable as follows, to wit: Three thousand dollars in gold coin, payable six months after the date of said mortgage, with interest at the rate of two per cent. per month, payable monthly, from the 25th day of January, A. D. 1868, and interest thereon; Three thousand dollars in gold coin, payable in nine months from the date of said mortgage, with interest thereon, at the rate of one per cent. per month, payable quarterly, from the fifteenth day of September A.
