LOCAL MATTERS.

NOTE advertisement of Superintendent H. Bendell for Indian Supplies.

MR. SOLOMON W. FOREMAN, Deputy U. S. Surveyor in this Territory, took the stage on Tuesday last for California, there being no field work ready for him for a few months yet.

OUR fashionable tonsorial operator, Samuel Bostick, is fitting up and beautifying his saloon in such a manner as to make it an ornament to town. He will be ready to receive all his old patrons in style to-morrow.

We would respectfully suggest to our worthy town fathers the propriety of enforcing the requirements of the ordinance in relation to streets. The sickly season is now approaching and our thoroughfares need some special attention.

NOTHING has been heard from Governor Safford and party since their departure. Though there was a rumor in circulation that they had been surprised by Apaches and the stock stamped. Evidently the rumor has no foundation.

THURSDAY night, May 9, Juan Ochoa was terribly beaten over the head with a four-pound iron weight, by Manuel Martinez. It occurred in a grog-shop in the upper part of town. Martinez was brought before Justice Meyers and put under \$1,000 bonds to await the result of the injury, which is considered precarious.

THE prospecting party headed by Mr. G. H. Oury, which left this town on the 10th of April last, has been coming in in detachments for the last three days. They are now all in—having accomplished the tour without serious misfortunes to any. They did not succeed in their undertaking as well as they anticipated. They were lost in the mountain for a week and suffered some for want of water. Although, as a whole, they represent their trip as one of rustic pleasure.

MR. S. W. FOREMAN having completed the survey of this town, on the 4th instant, a committee of the Common Council, consisting of Messrs. S. R. DeLong, W. W. Williams and Samuel Hughes examined the work in connection therewith and pronounced it satisfactory. At a meeting of the Council on the evening of the 4th, Mr. Foreman presented the map and field notes of the survey, which were accepted, and settlement made by the payment of \$1,200 in cash, and the balance (\$3,800) in notes of six and nine months, at one per cent. per month after the expiration of three months.

THERE is trouble again on the Eastern Mail route—no mail having been received here since last Saturday. Up to this writing (Friday noon) nothing has been heard from the two mails that are over due, and should have arrived on Monday and Thursday. Our citizens are much alarmed in consequence and Lieutenant Bendire this morning sent out twenty men with ten days' rations to investigate the matter. The mails going East have been sent out regularly since the non-arrival but nothing has been heard from them since their departure. It is conjectured by some that the mails have been detained by high water. It is to be hoped that it is nothing more alarming.

THE Texas Pacific Supplemental bill passed the Senate April 20. The following dispatch from S. O. Houghton, dated Washington 25, which we clip from the San Diego Union, explains it:

The Texas Pacific Supplemental bill passed in the Senate requires work to be commenced at San Diego within one year and the completion of twenty-five miles in three years. It will be amended in the House so as to require work to begin in one year, and not less than ten miles to be completed in the second year, and twenty-five miles every year thereafter. Scott agrees to this. Reliable engineers say that eighteen months will be required to make the tunnel in the first section of the second twenty-five miles.

GREENBACKS in San Francisco, April 30, were buying at 90, and selling at 90 1/2.

ANOTHER APACHE MURDER.

Cachise on the Warpath Again--Buckboard Taken In--Driver Shot, Scalped and Burned.

Yesterday evening, at 3:30 Mr. Monson, the Mail Agent, on the line East of this place arrived and gives the following unwelcome news: On Saturday evening May 4, about half past five the buckboard coming west was attacked at Steal's Peak, about 35 miles east of Apache Pass, and the driver, Henry Abraham, a discharged soldier of the Eighth Cavalry, and formerly of San Francisco, where he has friends residing, was shot, scalped and burned. The buckboard had on three sacks of mail matter—one through letter, one way mail, and one paper sack. They were all destroyed by fire, including the buckboard. Twelve soldiers and a guide started out from Apache Pass as soon as notified and found the wreck on the 6th. Mr. Monson came along on the night of the 6th and picked up the irons belonging to the burnt buckboard and brought them in to Tucson. The guide (Merejildo) thinks there were about 25 or 30 Indians. He also thinks it was Cachise's band who committed the murder, as Cachise has a pass from the Indian Agent in New Mexico to go in the direction of Apache Pass, and it is known that he went in that direction. The soldiers buried Henry Abraham where he was killed and returned to Apache Pass. Mr. Monson informs us further that Abraham had two weeks since received a letter from a brother urging him to return to California, and he had decided to do so, and that this was his last trip over the road. Poor fellow, it was his last trip surely.

Board of Supervisors.

The Board met May 6. A communication was received from Governor Safford recommending that Wm. Four, of Oatman Flat, Pima county, be authorized to collect toll on his road. It was ordered that the Clerk of the Board notify the said Wm. Four, to make a report and send all original papers or copies thereof pertaining to his road, in compliance with the law, and if he has not complied with the requirements of the law, to do so at his earliest possible time.

The report of the viewers appointed to view and lay out a public road through the lane running west of Tucson, south of the spring on the property of G. H. Oury, was received, and upon the recommendation of said viewers it was ordered that the said lane be and it is hereby declared a public highway to the "old Mission." It was ordered by the Board that Wm. Thompson be and he is hereby appointed a Justice of the Peace in and for Sanford precinct, Pima county, to fill vacancy now existing.

D. C. Thompson, Road Overseer in Gila River district, delivered to the Board twenty-five road tax receipts, amounting to \$50, being the whole amount with which he is charged.

Warrants in payment of accounts presented and allowed, were drawn on the County Treasurer to the amount of \$604 47.

Board adjourned to Monday June 3
