**LOCAL MATTERS.**

It is the intention of the children of  
the public schools to have a picnic some  
time next week.

We are pleased to thank a member of  
the 5th Cavalry for a fine collection of  
flowers.

The new brewery establishment is fast  
approaching completion. It is a fine  
structure.

The widening of streets has come to  
astand still. We hope the Marshal will  
complete his work.

The town is kept very clean, but we  
know of four hundred dogs that need kill-  
ing.

C. O. BROWN, Major Duffield and sev-  
eral others are out looking after mines,  
but we have nothing new in that line this  
week.

At San Carlos reservation Tully &  
Ochoa received the contract for barley at  
\$5.87 1/2, and Goldberg contract for hay at  
\$22.50.

COL. HUGGS and Gov. Safford visited the  
public schools in Tucson on Thursday.  
The Colonel was quite astonished at the  
rapid progress the children have made.

A SALE of town lots will take place to-  
day at the city Recorder's office. A rare  
chance will be offered to make a fortune  
in real estate.

A SPECIAL meeting of the Board of  
Supervisors is called May 5, to take into  
consideration the proposition of building a  
fire-proof vault for the county records.

CAPT. CRANDALL has been repairing his  
block of buildings on the Church Plaza,  
putting in new doors and windows, and  
making a cement front. This improve-  
ment adds much to the value of the prop-  
erty and the beauty of the town.

JOSEPH PIERSON's train loaded with  
30,000 lbs. of flour consigned to M. I.  
Jacobs & Co., arrived yesterday from Ter-  
renate, Sonora. Mr. Pierson says that the  
Apaches have been very quiet recently  
along the border in Sonora.

A. C. SCOTT is sinking a well between  
Tucson and Camp Lowell. He intends to  
fence in about a thousand acres with wire  
for the purpose of ranching stock. The  
crazing is excellent and the business will  
be profitable, and of great convenience to  
the people in town.

A RACE came off on Monday against  
time. E. N. Fish drove to buggy two  
horses from Tucson to the post on the  
Rillito, 6 1/2 miles, in 25 1/2 minutes, win-  
ning the stakes, the wager being that  
he could not make the distance in 26 min-  
utes.

A FEW of Major Brown's friends called  
on him Thursday evening at the residence  
of Major Furey. The 5th Cavalry Band  
was there and gave some excellent music,  
and dancing was kept up until quite a late  
hour. Major and Mrs. Furey have the  
faculty of making every one happy at  
their home.

A LUNATIC named James Fletcher, who  
has been farming for some time past at  
Calabasas, was brought to town on Thurs-  
day and was taken before Judge Osborn  
and examined, and from his appearance  
and the evidence of witnesses, the Judge  
ordered him confined in the county jail,  
to be further examined on Tuesday next.  
The unfortunate man was formerly from  
Missouri and is represented as an indus-  
trious man.

THE regular meeting of the Village  
Council was held April 21st. Mayor Toole  
presiding.

The following accounts were allowed  
and ordered paid: John Wasson, \$28;  
Gabriel Ortega, \$16; W. J. Osborn, \$10 39.  
A sale of village lots was ordered April  
20th, at 2 p. m., at the Recorder's office.  
A resolution was passed requesting the  
Village Marshal to resign. A special meet-  
ing of the Village Council was held April  
23d; Wm. S. Oury presiding in absence of  
Mayor Toole. Account of S. McClatchey,  
allowed \$8. The Recorder was instructed  
to procure a cart to use in cleaning the  
streets. The report and account of Mar-  
shal Thayer were laid over for further ex-  
amination.

A MEXICAN was murdered on the road  
from Salt River to camp McDowell, April  
14th. It seems that three Mexicans were  
on their way to McDowell with a team,  
and the two survivors say that when  
within about five miles of the post, they  
were fired at by some Indians from the  
brush beside the road, and one of their  
number was instantly killed. Lieutenant  
Thomas was at once sent with a detach-  
ment of men from the post by Captain  
Montgomery, to follow and if possible,  
punish the Indians. We understand that  
Lieutenant Thomas found no evidence of  
there having been Indians at the point  
where the murdered man was found, and  
strong suspicions exist that he and some  
of his countrymen had some difficulty,  
and that he was killed by one of them.  
The matter will undoubtedly be fully in-  
vestigated.

J. C. Fairbanks arrived on Thursday  
from Grant.

Dr. Porter passed through Tucson this  
week for camp Grant, and will be sta-  
tioned there for the present.

Judge C. T. Hayden, Frank Larkin and  
Lieut. Rockwell went out on last Satur-  
day's stage.

Judge Titus and Dr. J. C. Handy left on  
Wednesday for old camp Crittenden and  
the Patagonia mines.

Colonel Royall arrived in Tucson last  
Wednesday from camp Grant, and left  
to-day by stage for California to pur-  
chase horses for this military department.

J. J. Morano and S. R. Chambers were  
in town this week from the upper Santa  
Cruz and report the crops looking well  
in that section.

John Smith, post sutler at McDowell,  
and Mr. Stiles from the Gila, came in on  
last Saturday, and left for home on Tues-  
day. While here Mr. Stiles gave bonds as  
Receiver of U. S. land office at Florence.

JOHN GREEN and Mr. Clark returned  
this week from a prospecting trip in the  
mountains northwest of Tucson. They  
found a large lode that has the appearance  
of containing considerable silver.

Colonel Toole and bride expect to leave  
Tucson on Monday on a wedding tour to  
Guaymas and other towns in Mexico. We  
wish them a pleasant journey and safe re-  
turn.

General Juan D. Luna and Calletano  
Silba arrived here yesterday from Sonora.  
The former has command of the militia  
forces of the State of Sonora, and the  
latter is a Colonel in the regular army.

Lieutenant Tutherly left camp Lowell  
last Thursday in command of D troop, 1st  
Cavalry, for McDowell. Lieut. Tutherly  
is a young officer of fine promise, and has  
made many friends during his residence at  
this post.

Gen. McCaffry, U. S. District Attorney,  
came in on the Monday's stage from Yuma,  
where he has been on professional busi-  
ness. Mr. Knowles, agent for Richard &  
Co., came in from the Gila on the same  
stage, and returned on Tuesday.

Capt. Hamilton and lady, with H troop,  
5th Cavalry, arrived at camp Lowell on  
Tuesday. Capt. Hamilton and company  
have recently come from an extensive  
campaign after the Apaches, where they  
did most excellent service and were highly  
complimented by Gen. Crook.

Judge John Anderson after a year's ab-  
sence, came back on Monday, and ex-  
pressed himself as delighted to get on to  
his old stamping ground once more. He  
intends visiting the settlements of Arizona  
on business connected with the house of  
J. M. Goewey & Co.

Maj. Babcock arrived at the new post on  
the Rillito with his command, consisting  
of A and I troops, 5th Cavalry, and left on  
Thursday for Camp Grant. The Maj. and  
his troops were specially complimented  
by the department commander for gal-  
lantry and bravery in the closing campaign  
against the Tonto Apaches.

Maj. W. H. Brown, Col. Kellogg and  
Col. Hugus came in on Tuesday. Major  
Brown will take command of camp Grant.  
He deserves a good rest after his long and  
arduous campaign after the Indians. The  
Major has been very successful as an In-  
dian fighter, and has received from the  
department commander, deserved and  
high compliments for his energy, bravery  
and skill in the late campaign.

Capt. Harris and lady arrived in Tucson  
on Wednesday from California. He had  
under his charge about one hundred re-  
cruits. Also Lieut. Rogers, of E troop,  
5th Cavalry, now stationed at Bowie;  
Lieut. Eckerson, 5th Cavalry; Dr. Rust,  
assigned to camp Apache, and Emil S.  
Molkow, draftsman in the U. S. Surveyor-  
General's office, came with Capt. Harris  
and detachment. Capt. Harris belongs to  
M troop, 1st Cavalry, stationed at camp  
Apache, and he is now on his way to join  
his company. He has served before in  
Arizona, and was ordered east about two  
years ago on recruiting service. He was  
then a 1st Lieutenant, and has since been  
promoted. He has many friends in Ariz-  
ona who are pleased at his promotion,  
and that he has returned to us again.

A TERRIBLE gale has swept over
