## Another Murderer Killed and One Captured.

As matters are tending, we have hopes that the business of murder will diminish in Arizona. August 8, four murderers were hung in Tucson for murders committed early in the day before. August 18, Lucas Lugas and Manuel Subiate brutally beat and cut and shot to death Edward Lumley, at Kenyon Station on the Yuma road; and on the 31st of the same month, Lugas was shot to death and Subiate captured and taken to the Yuma county jail, where it is to be hoped he will not remain long until convicted and hung as the law requires.

It seems these murderers of Lumley went from Salt River valley direct to Kenyon Station. The first report that they fled to Sonora was not true, for they kept on down the Gila and traces of them were discovered all the way to the place where one was killed and the other captured on New River in Lower California, on or near the road leading to San Diego. According to the Yuma Sentinel's report, Frank Fitzhugh, Elisha House (Stage Superintendent), John McQuade and Jose Ochoa commenced the chase, but for obvious reasons could not follow up beyond Col. Woolsey's station. Col. Woolsey sent word to Sheriff Goodwin. August 21, Aug. Humboldt and Frank Townsend took the trail and were afterward joined by L. A. Smith to whom Sheriff Goodwin gave a warrant to make arrests. They followed down the Colorado to Smith's Ferry, about forty miles below Yuma, and found the murderers had crossed the river. On Thursday, Under Sheriff Tyner and Mr. Burkhardt took the trail and went direct to New River and succeeded in finding them near Indian Wells, and by aid of Indians they found and captured Subiate after firing some shots which slightly wounded him in the back, head and point of his nose. At the same time, they captured one of Moore & Carr's stage horses taken from Kenyon Station when the murder was committed. Under Sheriff Tyner, in the meantime, had sent word to M. H. Horn of New River Station, giving him facts about Lugas and offering a reward for his capture; whereupon Mr. Horn, Henry Gray and George Hantz started on the trail and finally, on the morning of the 31st of August, they came upon him in a thick underbrush. Horn and Hantz went for him and after considerable hooting and attempts to shoot on both sides, Horn got a shot into the back of Lugas's head, which proved fatal in half an hour.

Manuel Subiate denies having any part in the murder but says Lugas did it. No one believes him, for when captured he had one of Moore & Carr's horses, and the clothing and dog of Lugas. There are many circumstances gathered all the way from the scene of the murder to the place of the capture, which leave no doubt in the minds of those best informed, that Subiate and Lugas did the deed and that the guilt of each is alike.

The persistent way these assassins were followed and the success attending it, can hardly fail to have a wholesome effect along the Gila where the stations are distant from each other and the keepers liable to be robbed or murdered at any time. It is a great pity that Subiate did not show fight like Lugas did, so that he might have been deservedly shot, too. Let it be understood that men who commit willful murder in Arizona, will be promptly shot, hung or in some way killed, and we feel sure that the crime of murder will soon become rare indeed.

## Pima County Debt.

Augustus Brichta Esq., County Recorder, obliges us with these facts and figures: Up to August 31, the County Treasurer had paid the old series of warrants up to 188 inclusive, leaving an amount unpaid up to January 1, 1873, of \$1,476 09. The warrants issued since January 1, 1873, amount to \$9,483 43. Add to this balance due on debt of 1872 and we find Pima county's debt to be on September 1, 1873, \$10,959 52.

THE MINER of last Saturday says: From a Cerbat letter we learn that very rich ore has been struck in the Hibernian mine, Wallapai district. The new "strike" will, says our correspondent, make a noise in the mining world.

The first marriage in the district was that of Mr. John Buckley to Miss Ann Carpenter, on the 3d day of July, 1873.

THE following items are taken from The Yuma Sentinel of September 6:

The Newbern was advertised to sail from San Francisco August 30. Shipments of freight during the week: D. Neahr by own teams 23,000 lbs. citizen freight, for Tucson. Wm. B. Hooper & Co.—By teams of Geo. L. Fields, 17,500 lbs. for Camp Grant. By Bennett's teams, 7,000 lbs. to S. H. Drachman at Tucson. By Sam. Edward's team, 14,000 lbs. to Messrs Zeekendorf & Welisch, P. Abadie & Co., and S. H. Drachman, at Tucson. John S. Carr, long a member of the well known firm of Hooper & Co., severed his connection with that firm a few days since, and having sold his real estate here, left by stage for San Francisco.

The district school house is now being thoroughly renovated by Mr. Johnson. The improvement will add greatly to the comfort and convenience of teachers and pupils. Boys and girls are in future to occupy separate departments. The building will be ready for occupation about the 6th of October, when school is to re-commence.

The Sentinel highly compliments Sheriff Goodwin and Under-Sheriff Tyner for their efforts in the capture of the murderers of Edward Lumley.

LIEUT. C. P. EAGAN has received instructions to build new storehouses and quarters at Camp Mohave. Camp Hualpai was abandoned August 27.

Lieut. Dove commands the telegraphic construction party from San Diego to Yuma; Lieut. D. J. Craigie from Yuma to Maricopa Wells; Lieut. J. F. Trout from Prescott southward. These several parties are under command of Capt. Geo. F. Price.

NEW YORK, August 31.—Col. T. A. Scott will return about the first of October. The negotiations for the Texas Pacific have been successful.
