The mail from Prescott to Mohave will hereafter leave Prescott every Tuesday so as to make better connections from the south and California.

Potato bugs, squash bugs, Colorado beetles and the like, have done considerable damage to vegetable crops in this vicinity this season. We were quite astonished at the number and variety of these pests found on a single potato hill a week or two since at American Ranch.

The announcement of Hon. Hiram S. Stevens, as a candidate for re-election to Congress from Arizona, will be found in this issue of the Miner. We have never had the pleasure of meeting Mr. Stevens, but have received many kind attentions from him in his capacity as Delegate, for which we take this occasion to thank him.

Doc. Hammond, J. W. Read and Thomas Harris who brought in one from Pinal, Globe district, returned yesterday with a prairie schooner load of supplies. They informed us that they could get a better price for their ore here than in California, and express themselves perfectly satisfied with returns.

The tide of immigration is flowing this way. Another advanced guard of several families arrived this week from Kansas. They propose, before anchoring permanently to take a look at the Gila valley. These wagons came through via the "North Star Road."

Says the San Diego Union of July 11: We are pleased to acknowledge a call yesterday from Mr. B. W. Reagan of Florence A. T., who arrived here a day or two since en route to San Francisco.

WASHINGTON, July 8.—F. D. Grant, Fourth Cavalry, has been promoted to First Lieutenant, in the same regiment.

CHICAGO, July 8.—The loss by the destruction and damage of property in the State of Iowa by the late storms is estimated at \$1,000,000, and the loss of life is estimated at about fifty. Thirty-eight bodies from the Rockdale flood are said to have been recovered, leaving but three more to find.

NEW YORK, July 11.—A band of 800 Mormons, recently arrived from Europe, have started for Utah via the Pennsylvania Railroad. Some of the men have as many as eight wives.
