LOCAL MATTERS.

Supervisor's Proceedings.

Monday, July 12, 10 o'clock a. m. The Board of Supervisors met pursuant to adjournment. Present Supervisor Wheat with Jno. J. Devine, clerk. There being no quorum present no business was transacted and Board adjourned until the 14th proximo.

Wednesday, August 14, 10 o'clock a. m. The Board of Supervisors met pursuant to adjournment. Present Supervisors Colliwood and Wheat with Jno. J. Devine, clerk. The minutes of proceedings had July 23, read and approved. After which the Board took under consideration the amount of taxes to be levied for county general purposes on each \$100 of taxable property in the county, and it was ordered that in addition to the sums required by law to be levied, that the further sum of \$1.25 be levied and collected on each \$100 of taxable property, both real and personal in the county for county general purposes.

The petition of twenty-seven persons, (heads of families) residing at the Picket Post, praying that a school district be known as the Picket Post School District be established, was read. After reading said petition and in accordance with the recommendation of the County School Superintendent, the district as prayed for is hereby established, bounded as follows, to-wit:

Beginning at the northwest corner of township 4, south of range 10 east; thence running due north to the north line of the county; thence east to the western boundary line of Globe School District; thence south to the north line of township 4, south range 10 east.

The following accounts were audited and ordered paid:

H. B. Murry, purchased account, \$15.

On motion of Mr. Wheat, ordered that the following election Precincts be and the same are hereby established for election purposes throughout the county, and that the place for holding the polls at each of said precincts be set opposite the name and number of each and every precinct, together with the names of inspectors and judges thereof, as follows:

Said bond to be presented for approval to the Board of Supervisors on or before the 19th proximo.

Board adjourned until Monday the 19th proximo, at 10 o'clock a. m.

INCORPORATIONS.

Articles of Incorporation of the Silver Queen Silver Mining Company, were filed in the Recorder's office yesterday. The capital stock is \$1,000,000, and is divided into 100,000 shares. W. S. M. Wright, David Clark, T. J. Ludroig, C. G. Ames and G. L. Crane; all of Santa Rosa, California, are the first Directors.

DR. J. M. MCKEE of Los Angeles, who went up to Tucson last week to look after mining and other matters, called upon us Wednesday morning. He was on his return trip and expected to reach Los Angeles to-morrow. He was much pleased with what he saw in our southern mining districts and seemed convinced that the claims in Aztec, Toltec and other Districts were not "pockets," but true veins. Dr. McKee is so well pleased with our southern country and prospects that he has concluded to yield to the earnest solicitations of friends, and will at once locate in Tucson. It will require two or three weeks for him to arrange his business affairs in Los Angeles prior to leaving. The Dr. has a high reputation as a physician and was for several years President of the Medical Society in Southern California. He represents a company of energetic capitalists, and is one of that class of men who will aid greatly in the development and progress of our Territory.

THE weather is jolly. The rains are semi-occasional. The Gila has arrived opposite town. The ditches are full and Florence is way up. Every one is happy. The valley looks fresh and new. We had feared we might be numbered with the aztec ruins, but the danger is over, the country is safe. The water supply will be abundant for the remainder of the year, and we trust this will be the last of the dry seasons for some time to come.

MAT LARKIN returned from Phenix on Saturday night by private conveyance.

"Here We are Again."

Once more the stage from Tucson has been stopped and plundered by a single highwayman. The stage left Tucson last Thursday with two passengers, and as it happened Authur Hill was again the driver. Mr. John Miller, one of the passengers, was sitting on the outside and as they neared the Point of mountain he asked Mr. Hill to show him just the place where the coach was robbed on July 31. Mr. Hill replied that it was only a short distance ahead and he would point out the spot. They reached the place, "There," said Mr. Hill, "the robber was hid behind that bush;" Mr. Miller nodded, "and there he is again," shouted the driver with the same breath, as the same masked robber sprang from behind the same bush, and pranced before the horses shouting, "Yes, here I am again, throw up your hands," &c. The surprise of the gentlemen on the box can easily be imagined. In fact there is a decidedly ludicrous side to this "stage of the game," or game of the stage, or the game stage robber, or—but more serious incidents follow. The mail sacks and express box were thrown out, the man on the inside lost only about \$8; but Mr. Miller was more unfortunate, he was obliged to give up his pocket-book which contained about \$226. Mr. Miller is a poor man with a large family and can ill afford the loss. He has the earnest sympathy of his many friends. The stage arrived at Desert station just about dark and parties left for Tucson immediately to notify the authorities. We understand that the Sheriff's posse, while on their way to the scene of the robbery, met a lone horseman with whom they conversed, but did not arrest. This shows a want of judgment or courage, or both. The next morning the posse took the robber's track and trailed it directly back to the place where they met the lone horseman. No arrests have yet been made.

ANOTHER STAGE ROBBERY.

We understand just before going to press that both stages were robbed by four Mexican highwaymen between Florence and Tucson on last evening somewhere beyond the Picocho, and passengers even lost their boots. Some of the horses belonging to the stage reported to be taken, leaving the passengers to foot it for several miles.

MINING has increased to such an extent that competent miners are scarce, and the news comes from Pima county that mining work in some instances has been suspended for want of good miners. Wages vary. Some pay \$2 per day of eight hours, with good board and bunk in comfortable house to sleep in; others pay a little more; still others pay \$3 or more, the miner finding his own lodging and food. Prospecting is generally rewarded with the finding of promising veins, and therefore most miners only care to work till they get means to buy an outfit for a month or two, and then "try their luck" instead of continuing in good situations on fixed wages.

From the Yuma Sentinel.

Last Monday night a drunken Indian crept up on Francisco Olea, who was sleeping on a mat near the Mexican bakery, on Second street, and stabbed him twice. The first thrust broke off the point of the knife; the second broke off about three inches of the blade and left the piece sticking in the wound. The Indian made good his escape without being recognized.

A new and strong mercantile firm is to be started in Tucson by Wm. Zeckendorf, well known there, and Mr. Staab, a New Mexican millionaire. Some 30,000 pounds of goods have come for them and 100,000 more are on the way.

A grand memorial service to their dead is to be performed by the Indians on the Colorado Indian reserve, at the close of the present moon. Indians have been invited from all quarters. Many have come from San Carlos, as well as Shoshones, Plutes and Chimehuevis. The visitors are well supplied with arms. Horses have been gathered and are being fattened on mesquite beans, to furnish funeral baked meats. Great piles of wood have been gathered for pyres. It is going to be a regular Indian "high jinks."

In New York.

We notice by the dispatches of the 6th inst., that Dr. C. H. Lord with his wife and daughter and Mrs. Austin, all of Arizona, were registered at the St. James Hotel in New York City. We may infer from this that Mrs. Austin has reached her home in improved health. We hope such is the case and congratulate the good lady and her friends.
