LOCAL MATTERS.

From Saturday's Daily.
Mr. S. S. ARNOLD is in town from the Longavina Mine (old Fraguita), in the Arizona District. The mine he is working is owned by the Papago Chief Company of Red Oak, Iowa, and he has been working at it several weeks, putting down a prospecting shaft, about a hundred feet from the old Mexican shaft, which is full of water and rubbish. Three shafts of men have been at work, and a depth of fifty feet has been reached. Assays have been made every few feet, as carefully as possible, and the richness of the mineral has steadily increased, having been assayed at \$368.46 at the commencement of the work and \$965.74 at the present depth. The vein has widened from fourteen to twenty-four inches, and the walls are perpendicular and very perfect. Work will go on to the depth of a hundred feet before a halt is made. There are numerous claims held by prospectors, who are waiting for a sale, in the vicinity of the Longavina; but nothing has been done beyond assessment work. And now that Mr. Arnold has shown such a fair prospect in his mine, the holders of the others have suffered up greatly. Imagine themselves millionaires again.

Accident.
A serious accident is reported to have happened to ex-Delegado Stevens and Gen. Rice, of Washington, on Sunday last. They were traveling between the Empire ranch and old Camp Crittenden, on their way to the Patagonia mines, when, as they drove along a steep place in the road, above a bank, the bank slid away and overturned both horses and wagon. Both gentlemen were thrown out with great force. Mr. Stevens was caught between the wheels and received a severe cut in the leg, and was otherwise bruised about the head and body. Gen. Rice was also badly hurt, but it seems less severely than Mr. Stevens. One of the horses had a leg broken, and had to be shot. Both gentlemen were conveyed to Hughes' ranch, where they now are. An ambulance has been sent out to convey them here.

The patriotic Mexicans of our population will celebrate the anniversary of the expulsion of the French from Mexico, in 1821, on Monday next at Levin's Park. The exercises will commence at 11 o'clock a. m. Señor Carlos Velasco will be the orator of the occasion; and a hymn composed by Prof. Medina, will be sung by a large chorus.

Wm. Griffith. Of the stage line, came in last night from the north. He reports that when he left Maricopa two days ago, the track was laid six miles this side of the station, and work was continuing at the old rate.

Pete Kitchen is in from the south. He says that the basement and corral of the new hotel at Calabasas are about completed, being built of brick. The work on the structure is progressing finely.

Mr. J. E. Bailey and **Dr. O. S. Runnels** left last evening for Arizona and the adjacent country. They will be followed thither this afternoon by Messrs. Gage and Chipman.

Harris' train of fine animals is in today and occupied the front view of THE CITIZEN office for some time this morning.

From Monday's Daily.
Dr. T. S. Hitchcock, our local dentist is doing some neat work in taxidermy, carving, &c. At his office this morning we saw an immense horn, the former property of a thoroughbred Texas steer, upon which had been traced some beautiful designs, such as gracefully twining vines, evenly balanced leaves, stately castles and other beautiful figures chiseled out with exquisite skill and accuracy. The doctor also showed us a horned toad and a Gila Monster, which he had just filled with such ingredients as will insure their preservation for time indefinite. Dr. H. is also collecting as rapidly as possible, arrow heads, stone axes, pipes, and such other ancient Indian implements as he can get possession of, and will form an interesting and valuable cabinet of these quaint Arizona specimens. The Dr. has already gathered several cabinets of this character in various sections of the United States and he manifests a deep interest in natural history and specimens of antiquity. Dr. Hitchcock's collections will be doing the doctor a favor and our Territory a benefit by supplying his cabinet with choice specimens of native birds, reptiles, Indian relics and other articles of interest and curiosity.

The "Fifth of May" anniversary is receiving the attention of our Mexican residents to-day. Señor Velasco spoke for half an hour, to the great admiration of his hearers and was followed by the singing of the "Himno a Zaragoza" composed by Professor Medina specially for the occasion. At one o'clock the company numbering over a hundred ladies and gentlemen sat down to a lunch at Levin's furnished forth in the best style of that well-known provider. As we go to press the dancing is just beginning, and the enjoyment is high.

The manner of celebrating the day is very commendable, and will form an excellent model when it comes to talking about the "Glorious Fourth."

The Common Council held a regular meeting at the office of the City Recorder on the 6th inst. at 7 p. m. Full Council present except Mayor Toole who is out of town.
