No. 3 to Phoenix, A. T.; Nos. 7, 18 and 31 to Whipple Depot, A. T.; and Nos. 8 and 21 to Fort Verde, A. T.

The Board will, if practicable, fix the responsibility for the delay.

WEDNESDAY.

William Vernon returned home from a visit to San Francisco this morning, looking hale and hearty.

The Valencianna Mine, Black Canyon, we are informed by Mr. W. W. Hutchison, is turning out some very rich gold ore.

Barnett & Block's train, coming from Apache county with salt, left Camp Verde this morning, enroute to the Peck mine.

We understand that Mr. Sol Jackson is once more the recipient of a present from Mrs. J. A. Big boy—nothing short.

A team belonging to J. M. Bryan passed through town this morning enroute to Fort Whipple with merchandise for the government.

We are told that good breakfast bacon can be laid down in Prescott from the East via New Mexico, at 12 or 13 cents per pound.

Henry Edgerton delivered an eloquent address of welcome to General Grant and party on the occasion of their visit to Sacramento.

A movement is on foot in Chicago to give Gen. Grant a reception that will surpass that given him in San Francisco. New York ought to try her hand.

LETTER FROM OAKLAND.

OAKLAND, CAL., Oct. 21st, 1879.

Ed. MINER.—Day before yesterday I went to see our former townsman, Philip Kohlbeier, at the German Hospital on 14th St., San Francisco, where I found him well cared for under the direction of the Masonic Board of Relief, but am sorry to say to his many friends in Prescott, that the hospital physician informed me that his case is altogether hopeless, and he expects him to die within a week.

Philip, on his arrival at the hospital from Florence, A. T., where he has resided since he left Prescott, was examined and found to be suffering from an abscess of the liver. An operation was performed and much of the diseased portion removed, but the doctor informed me that it was a very bad case indeed, and so much of the abscess remained, and so much of the liver had to be removed, that it would be almost a miracle if he should recover. I shall call again in a few days. He was not allowed to talk much, though he recognized me, and wanted to ask a great many questions, but was prevented by his attendant.

I met P. B. Brauer in San Francisco yesterday, he had just returned from Bartlett Springs, where he had been for his health, and found that he grew worse instead of better. He now goes to San Diego for the winter. Gideon Brooke is still at Bartlett Springs, not much improved. Will write more when I see and learn more.

A dispatch from Bloomington, Ill., dated Oct. 21st, says: About noon yesterday, William Hogg, one of the oldest and most respected citizens of Bloomington, but a most eccentric man, shot his daughter Mary, aged eighteen.
