Letter From Hon. T. J. Butler.

AT SEA, OFF SAN LOUIS OBISPO, SEPT. 15th, 1881.

ED. MINER.—My last letter, dated at San Diego, some time last week, forgot the exact date, had something to say of the San Diego branch of the A. & P. R. R. and the boom at that place consequent upon the completion of four miles of track along and below the water front of that city.

And now, having spent five days in Santa Barbara, where I had hoped to record similar excitation over the prospect of railroad connection with the outer world by way of the northern branch of the same road, I found myself and the people disappointed, and they dependent over reported changes in the line of the road, which it is feared will take it through the San Joaquin Valley to Santa Cruz, and leave Santa Barbara out in the cold.

This fear is based upon the fact that the Company's engineers are now running a line through that country, and the Bakersfield and other papers along the route are declaring that the change is positively determined upon, which, of course, may or may not be true.

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INDIAN WAR ENDED. Thanks to General Willcox and all of his officers and men, the Indian outbreak is nipped in the bud.

Whenever occasion called for it we have not been backward in speaking the truth of Safford, Hoyt, Fremont and others, and when we thought that we perceived in Gen. Willcox a disposition to lean toward our beloved brethren of Pima county (Tucson) we were outspoken.

Had it not been for the energy displayed, the wise course pursued and determined stand of Gen. Willcox, in the hour of peril and great danger, Arizona would certainly have been plunged, to-day, in a deep and blood for blood war. It has been averted, and to the General belongs the credit. He will be held in dear remembrance by our people for his quick and wise policy in the premises. THE MINER accords to him all praise.

TO DAY'S NEWS. LONG BRANCH, Sept. 20.—Mrs. Garfield bore the trying ordeal with great fortitude and exhibited unprecedented control of her feelings.

After death had been pronounced and the body was properly arranged by Dr. Boynton telegrams were immediately sent to the President's mother in Ohio, and his sons Harry and James, who are at Williams college, and also to the Vice President and other public men.

NEW YORK, Sept. 20.—The Evening Post Long Branch special says this has been received by Mrs. Garfield: "Words cannot express the deep sympathy I feel with you. May God bless and comfort you as he alone can." (Signed.) Queen, Balmoral.
