FIRST DEATH IN PANAMINT.—Wm. Masterson, who died on the 13th inst. from the effects of a knife wound received at the hands of Wm. McLaughlin, some three or four weeks ago, was buried yesterday in Sour Dough Canyon. His funeral was largely attended by his friends, who are deeply sorrowed by his untimely taking off. This is the first death of a white person to record in Panamint since it became a town, although we are told that bones have been dug up here, by persons excavating for cellars, which are supposed to be those of white men killed in 1872-3. The friends and acquaintances here of the deceased do not know of the whereabouts of any of his relatives, but it is believed a brother is living somewhere in Calaveras county.—Panamint News.

A certain tract of land in the counties of Mohave and Yavapai, Territory of Arizona, about fifty miles west of Hardyville on the Colorado river, situate on the 25th parallel and described as follows: Beginning at the head of Francis Creek at a certain monument erected by John Moss, on his trail from Fort Mohave to Prescott, in the year 1864 near the large black or burnt mountain, said Francis Creek being one of the tributaries of the Colorado River. Commencing at said monument for a center of the west line, and running from said center north six miles and eighteen 22-100 chains; thence east twelve miles and 26-100 chains; thence south twelve miles and 26-100 chains; thence west twelve miles and 26-100 chains; thence north six miles and 26-100 chains; thence east twelve miles and 26-100 chains; thence south twelve miles and 26-100 chains; thence west twelve miles and 26-100 chains; thence north six miles and 26-100 chains. The said location being made under an act of Congress to confirm certain private land claims in New Mexico, and being known as location number five (5). All of which is more fully set forth in the complaint hereto in which reference is made.
