VILLAGE COUNCIL.

APRIL 6, 1875. Council met at 7:30 o'clock P. M., pursuant to adjournment. Present—his honor the Mayor, and councilmen Foster and Tompkins. Minutes of the last meeting read and approved.

REPORT ON STREETS AND ALLEYS AND THE BRIDGING OF GRANITE CREEK.—Since the subject of the opening of streets and alleys has been brought to our notice, I have taken particular pains to ascertain, first, the necessity for it, as regards the public needs or convenience; second, what expense, if any, would have to be incurred.

I find that no immediate necessity exists for opening any more streets than are now open for the public, and used as streets and highways, and no serious complaints are reported of any inconvenience to the public.

II. I find that on the closest examination and enquiry that the opening of Goodwin street across Granite creek, will necessitate the payment of more money to one party, Mr. V. A. Stephens, than is now in the village treasury; and other expenses that would thereby be incurred, would necessitate the levying of a tax on the property holders of the town.

It is true, certain parties have proposed that, in view of the opening of Goodwin street across Granite creek, they would build a good bridge across said creek, which is much desired by a number of citizens, but considering the finances available and on hand, I would recommend that the same be deferred, at least until next Fall.

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MAIL MATTERS.—A dispatch which we publish elsewhere, directed to Postmaster J. S. Giles, will enlighten the reader as to what has been done at Washington with reference to the Arizona mails.

THE INTERESTS OF SCOUTS STEWART AND JONES in the Sandy mines will be kept to insure the fullest service between that place and San Francisco, and of course we must share in the benefits thus arising, as Prescott is the natural terminus of the line let it come from where it will.

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BOARD OF SUPERVISORS.

Board of Supervisors met Monday, April 5th, at 10 o'clock. Present—Supervisors G. Cornell and A. O. Noyes and the Clerk.

Minutes of the preceding meeting read and approved.

The Board having made a list of persons qualified and liable to serve as Jurors for the year 1875 in this county, ordered that the Clerk furnish a certified copy thereof to the Clerk of the District Court. Board adjourned till next day.

April 6th.—Present—Supervisors Geo. D. Kendall, G. Cornell, A. O. Noyes and the Clerk.

After the minutes were read and approved, the Board took under consideration the account of Maricopa County against Yavapai County for services rendered in the case of People vs. Wm. B. Hellings, and ordered the same referred to the Dist. Att'y, requiring him to report his opinion as to the correctness of the same to the Board.

The following accounts were audited and allowed: Wm. Wilkerson—Record Books, \$16 80

George Lount—repairs of locks on Iron doors, \$15.

John G. Campbell—merchandise for Clerk's Office, \$14.75.

John G. Campbell—furniture for Treasurer's Office, \$81.25.

Wm. Wilkerson—Recorder's fees and quarter's salary, \$104.

ARIZONA MINER—printing and advertisements, \$100.

R. H. Weaver—supplies for Mrs. Steinbrook, for one month, \$30.

John G. Campbell—balance on chairs ordered by Judge Porter, \$8.

T. Whitehead—for feeding indigent and prisoners for one quarter, \$91.33.

J. H. Marion—stationery for Treasurer's Office, \$20.50.

Charles Yates—digging Dr. Willing's grave, \$25.

Ed. W. Wells—salary 1st quarter as Dist. Att'y, office rent &c., \$91.

Frank Powers—services in Justice's court as interpreter, \$5.

W. Z. Wilson—coffins for Dr. Willing and Baroski, \$90.

H. H. Carter—one month's salary as Probate Judge and Justice's fees, \$47.25.

Jas. C. Otis—Justice's fees 1st qr. 1875, \$35.

Ed. F. Bowers—Sheriff and Jailor's fees 1st qr., \$559.80.

The petition of Ed. F. Bowers, Sheriff, asking for the painting of Sheriff's office and Court-room, and repairing furniture etc. therein; also authority for purchasing lamps etc. for Court-room—granted as follows: Ordered that the Judge's chair be repaired, and that suitable lamps be furnished for the Court-room, together with the material necessary for the painting required, providing the work of painting the same be executed by prisoners.

Reports of H. H. Carter and Jas. C. Otis, Justices of the Peace, for 1st quarter 1875 were accepted and placed on file.

The Board resolved that all just claims for material furnished and services rendered at the funeral of the late Dr. Willing shall be paid, and when all of said claims have been paid, the Clerk of this Board is required to make out and forward an itemized account of the same to his father, now residing in St. Louis, Mo.

Board adjourned till next day, April 7th, at 10 o'clock, when a full Board was present.

The petition of Ed. F. Bowers asking for authority to build a fence around the County lot or lots in the rear of the courthouse and offices, on account of the County, the sum of \$58.72 was allowed as estimated cost of same.

The Treasurer and Sheriff made a settlement in full of all matters pertaining to the interest of the County between them. The Treasurer submitted his report for the 1st quarter of 1875, and a full settlement thereon was made.

Board adjourned.
