Report of the Grand Jury. To the Hon. C. A. Tweed, Judge of the Third Judicial District County of Yavapai Territory of Arizona.

We, the Grand Jurors of the County of Yavapai, Territory of Arizona, respectfully submit to you the following report:

We have found seven true Bills to wit: Four for Grand Larceny. Three for assault with intent to commit murder, or to do bodily injury.

We have also found one Bill of Commitment placed in the hands of the Hon. the District Attorney.

We have ignored four Bills presented. We have examined the offices of County Recorder, Treasurer and Sheriff, and find their Books and Records kept in a neat and business like manner, alike creditable to the County, as well as to the incumbents thereof.

We have also examined the offices and Books of the Justices of the Peace, H. H. Carter and Jas. C. Otis.

We find the Books and Records of Justice H. H. Carter, kept in a neat, plain and correct manner. The Books and Records of Jas. C. Otis, appear to have been kept very irregularly.

We have also examined the Public buildings to wit: The Court House and Jail. We find the Court House and Jail wholly unfit for the purposes intended and used, and we recommend of the next Legislature from this County, to use all honorable means to pass an Act by the next Legislature of the Territory of Arizona, whereby County Bonds may be issued, to enable this County to erect a suitable Court House and Jail, and other necessary buildings.

We have examined the Records and proceedings of the Board of Supervisors of the County of Yavapai, and find that Bills have been allowed and paid, on account of Indigent Sick, that appear to be exorbitant.

We would strongly recommend that a suitable building will be erected or leased, wherein the Indigent sick can be taken care of, and we believe that it would be a great saving to the County.

We have examined and inquired into the escape of one prisoner (Chas. Jones) from the County Jail, and
