FROM CAMP VERDE. Accidental Shooting—Visit from Indians.

We learn from the Indians, who arrived here recently from the Verde, that private Taylor, of Captain Carr's company, First Cavalry, had, while walking post, shot himself accidentally, and was not expected to survive.

The Indians. Have bustled themselves making smoke on the hills. Six of them came to the post a few days ago, and begged Captain Carr, the commandant, to give them something to eat. He counselled them to go out, bring in all their people, live up to the rules for the government of Reservations, when all would be fed and taken care of.

Elliott, furniture for Sheriff's office, 33 00; W. J. Berry, salary as Dist. Atty and rent, 112 50; John G. Campbell, services as supervisor, 20 00; Gideon Brooke, 21 00; A. L. Mueller, 18 00; John H. Behan, Sheriff's fees, etc., 822 00; Levi Bashford & Co. stationery, 17 20; Campbell & Buffum, hand-outs and leg irons, 53 00.

The following accounts were rejected: T. C. Warden, constable fees, \$59 00; John L. Taylor, witness fees, 300 00. [Board considering this not a county charge.]

Grand Jury. This body adjourned several days ago, after having found one true bill for murder against Henry Dawson, for the killing of Peter Eich, on the Verde, some time ago.

The Grand Jury, it is said, recommended that two of the cells in the jail be made secure, with iron spikes. The building of a fire-proof Recorder's office or something else, was also recommended. Have not heard that the body said anything for or against county officers.

Men and Things. C. P. Head arrived home last week, and started back to Salt River by last Saturday's buck-board. We understand he made an arrangement with Barnett & Block, of Phoenix, by which they are to deliver 200,000 pounds of grain at each of the northern posts.

Lost. Two or three members of the San Francisco Mountain party, who went out hunting, several days ago, have not been heard from, and it is feared that Indians have murdered them. Several persons are now out, searching for the missing ones.
