

and the chair so decided, when Mr. Adams asked to be excused from serving on the committee on Indian affairs, and he was excused.

On motion of Mr. Adams the house went into committee of the whole on the bill for the relief of Mrs. Harrison. A long debate ensued, after which the committee agreed to fill up the blank in the bill with \$25,000, and reported it to the house. The bill was then ordered to a third reading, and the house adjourned.

June 19.—The senate did not sit.

House.—This being petition day a number of petitions were presented on a variety of subjects. Mr. Adams, as usual, threw the house into a ferment with his abolition petitions, after which he presented a number of petitions on other subjects, among which was one from citizens of Baltimore, praying that John Quincy Adams may be expelled from the house.

Mr. Fillmore from the committee on ways and means reported a bill making appropriations for the expenses of the extra session. Ordered to be printed.

Mr. Barnard presented, "with much diffidence," a project for a national bank, which, he said, was the result of his cogitations on that subject for the last three months, and he hoped the house might be pleased to have it printed; and the house most graciously ordered it to be done.

Several resolutions were offered calling upon the president for information in relation to the seizure of American vessels on the coast of Africa by British cruisers.

Mr. Hunt offered a resolution instructing the committee on the currency to report a bill for the establishment of a national bank on the "following" plan. The "following" was supposed to be Mr. Barnard's plan, but it was not read, and the resolution was laid on the table.

Monday, June 21.—Senate.—Mr. Clay of Kentucky, chairman of the committee on finance, made a report on the subject of a national bank. The report is too long for insertion here, and we must content ourselves for the present with a very brief notice of it. It repudiates altogether the two features of the bill introduced by Mr. Ewing to satisfy constitutional objections. The most material is that which in Mr. Ewing's project, required the assent of the states to the establishment of branches in them. This the report treats as yielding the question of the constitutional power to establish a national bank. It argues elaborately this question, and insists on the establishment of branches without the assent of the states, to be the system contemplated by the committee.

Another point on which the report wholly repudiates the secretary's plan, is that which proposes to establish the principal bank in the District of Columbia. So far from doing this, the plan of the report takes the whole banking power out of the district, not even permitting an office of discount and deposit to exist within the district. It proposes to have a board of directors as a board of control within the district, but no bank holding any part of the capital, or possessing any power to discount.

The report, and the bill accompanying it, were ordered to be printed, and made the special order of the day for Wednesday next.

The debate on the report of the secretary of the treasury was resumed by Mr. Calhoun, who was followed by several speakers, after which the motion to print was carried without a division.

The bill to revive the charters of the banks in the District was debated, but no question was taken before the senate adjourned.

House.—Mr. Pickens announced that the Delegate from Florida (Mr. D. Levy) was at the bar of the house and moved he be sworn. Mr. Morgan objected, and said he had papers to show that he was not a citizen of the U. S., whereupon Mr. De Levy advanced in front of the speaker and said, "I appear here with the broad seal of Florida, as her delegate." This was conclusive with the speaker, and Mr. De Levy was qualified and took his seat.

The bill No 1, from the senate, to repeal the sub-treasury, was read twice and referred to the committee on ways and means.

Petitions being called for, Mr. Adams commenced where he left off on Saturday, and his bundle, like the widow's cruise of oil, seemed to increase with every draft upon it. When he finished, he returned thank to the house for patiently hearing him through, and sat down like Hercules of old, after having performed his last and most difficult labor.

The resolution calling upon secretary Ewing for his plan of a fiscal agent was taken up and passed.

The bill making appropriation for the extra session was taken up and passed. It appropriates \$397,665.

United States Circuit Court.—Important Order.

The United States Circuit Court, at its late term at Springfield, made the following order in relation to the valuation law of this state:

"When the Marshal shall levy a tax upon real estate, he shall have it appraised and sold under the provisions of the law of this state, entitled, 'An act regulating the sale of property,' approved 27th February, 1841, if the case come within the provisions of that law; and any two of the three householders selected under the law, may make a valuation of the premises required.

"Before the sale of any real estate on execution, the Marshal shall give notice

thirty (30) days in a paper published in the county where the land lies; and if there be no newspaper published in that county, then notice shall be given thirty days before the sale by notices, as the statute requires. The Court adopt the 8th section of the act of this state, to amend the act concerning judgments, &c., passed 19th February, 1841, which regulates the sale of landed premises, &c. except where special directions shall be given in the decree of sale."
