

Western Army!

At a large and respectable meeting of the citizens of Ottawa and vicinity, held pursuant to public notice at the court house on the evening of the 6th inst., for the purpose of taking into consideration the propriety of adopting measures for laying before the President of the United States the unrivalled advantages of the Illinois valley as a site for the location of the contemplated National Army about to be established in the Mississippi valley—D. BUCHANAN, Esq. was called to the chair and J. M. Crothers appointed secretary.

The object of the meeting having been stated, Michael Ryan, Esq. was loudly called for by the meeting, who responded to their call by a very elegant and appropriate speech, in which he most happily exhibited the importance of the subject as regards the interests of this portion of our country, and the many, unequalled, and happy combination of advantages which render this part of our state unrivalled in the West as a site for the location of such an establishment.

After Mr. Ryan had concluded J. J. Holt, Esq. presented the following preamble and resolution for the consideration of the meeting:

WHEREAS the Congress of the United States did, at its recent session, make provisions for the establishment of a Government Army in the valley of the Mississippi, and has conferred upon the President authority to choose a suitable location for the same: And whereas this section of country, from its many peculiar advantages over any other point yet designated for such location, is entitled to his respectful consideration; therefore

Resolved, That a committee of five be appointed for the purpose of enquiring into and reporting, in a full and complete manner, the natural resources and unrivalled advantages of this vicinity for the location of such an establishment, and to transmit the result of their investigation to the President of the United States, and to each of our Representatives and Senators in Congress, and to earnestly solicit their co-operation in our behalf.

The foregoing preamble and resolution having met with the approbation of the meeting, Messrs. Michael Ryan, W. H. W. Cushman, Joseph Cloud, Milton H. Swift, and J. F. A. Hays, were appointed said committee.

After some remarks by gentlemen present, on motion of J. O. Glover, Esq., it was

Resolved, That the proceedings of this meeting be published in the Ottawa Free Trader.
