HOUSEHOLD BRIEVITIES.

Soak the feet and bind on baking soda dampened and in the morning you will be surprised to find the soreness all out of course.

Flush furniture should never be switched in cleaning a room, but use a bristle brush. A small paint brush is desirable and is also a great help in dusting shutters.

All articles of clothing should be changed as frequently as possible. Especially should wet garments be replaced by dry ones as soon as an opportunity offers.

Beef Fritters.—Cut some thin slices from the undercut of the sirloin, and slice each slice into a half inch wide strips of eggs, flour and milk, seasoned with allspice, pepper and nutmeg; have a pan of very hot lard or butter ready, and place each slice well covered with the batter into it, fry a good brown.

An excellent recipe for corn bread is composed of two eggs, two tablespoonfuls of sugar, a little salt, two cupfuls of sour milk, two and a half cupfuls of corn-meal and one scant teacupful of saleratus dissolved in one-half cupful boiling water.

Dry Beans.—Wash two pint dry beans and put in one quart of cold water. After boiling add a small pinch of soda and cook three hours or longer. They may be seasoned either by cooking with a few slices of salt pork or by adding a quantity of butter when they are nearly done.

Bonnie Biscuits.—Three eggs, weight of the eggs in flour, weight of the eggs in sugar, weight of the eggs in butter; flavor with vanilla, lemon or almond. Pound the sugar; warm the butter and beat to a cream; gradually dredge in the flour and pound the sugar; and keep stirring and beating the mixture until perfectly smooth.
