Religion and Politics.

It all the voters of Barber County could have had the privilege of listening to the sermon of Rev. Archer at M. E. services last Sunday night, the people's party would cover the old parties so deep on next Tuesday resurrection day would never come to them. His subject was Religion and Politics. His text, "Render, therefore, unto Caesar the things that are Caesar's, and unto God the things which are God's." He first gave Webster's two definitions of the word "politics." First, the science of government; second, the management of political parties. With all earnestness he impressed upon us that, in the language of the martyred Lincoln, "This is a government of the people, by the people, for the people." Then every christian must exercise his right of suffrage in the best light he can obtain. Under the second definition he found so much in party management that was bad that he appealed to all good men to see that the campaign lie be removed from politics, and laid it down as a rule that it was nearly always safe to vote for the candidate that had the most mud thrown at him.

His subject was divided into four heads why every christian should enter politics and vote conscientiously. First, slander; second, oppression of the poor; third, temperance; fourth, corruption in politics. When commenting on slander, he read a campaign lie that had been published over one hundred years ago about George Washington. It was mild for this age, and most of our men of worth of righteous indignation expressed in his denunciation of political mud-slingers, we knew he must have been reading the report. He next spoke of the trusts, and illustrated it by telling that he had been buying coffee for 15 to 20 cents per pound, but his grocer informed him that Arbuckle had cornered the market, and now he must pay from 25 to 30 cents per pound, so that one rich man could make a million more from the consumer. There was no scarcity of coffee. It was simply oppression of the poor. Then he spoke of the sweating system, and wrong of the poor by the great protected manufacturers. He had no time for further illustrations, but every good Methodist brother knew he was appealing to them to help down the Santa Fe railroad system that is robbing the producer and consumer of Kansas of more than a million dollars every year, and has furnished the republican party with the major part of its boodle fund; and has said to the g. o. p. you must send attorneys, Geo. T. Anthony and Chester I. Long, to congress, and our other attorney, Ed. Sampier, to the legislature. He then spoke of temperance, and urged every christian to vote down the byra-headed monster that is bringing poverty and misery to so many homes, and debauching so many good men. Thought he was more earnest than usual on this subject, because so many of the good republican workers were upon such a jolly drunk the night before that not one of them were at church to hear him. Or, he might have heard of our would-be county attorney, who, while talking to a farmer at his wheat drill, brought out a bottle of wine, but seeing a man approaching asked, "Who is that?" The farmer answered, "A crank—a people's party man." Out of sight, buried deep in the wheat in the drill went the bottle. His Noble staid long, but the people's party man staid longer. He had to go without his bottle. His day's canvass was spoiled. He had no more red ink. His mamma's Dennis for that day, and he came home.

The last division of his subject brought him to corruption in politics. He said party organization was necessary and right, but that no man should allow himself to degenerate into a mere partisan, and that often in the history of a nation the parties become so corrupt that there had to be a breaking up of old parties and the formation of new ones; and when the time came no honest man should hesitate, but do his whole duty. He then said, with all the earnestness possible, "I feel right now like making a political speech, and if on the rostrum I would do it, but the pulpit is not the place. It was a good sermon, and if more of our ministers were true to their colors, and dared to preach as they feel, money and slander and whisky would not control so many votes. REPORTER.
