The final death blow to cheap lumber was delivered by the senate last Wednesday. The increased rate was adopted by a vote of 24 to 40. When you figure on building a house or barn, please remember how the republican party is benefitting you.

W. H. Haskell has resigned as warden of the penitentiary effective July 1st. Haskell was investigated and found wanting and his resignation followed as a matter of course. It is really a vindication for Kate Bernard of Oklahoma who made charges some months ago.

It is believed that the discharge of Warden Haskell at the state penitentiary was primarily for the purpose of making room for another ex-populist who has returned to the republican party. If Gov. Stubbs is looking for a politician of that stripe Barber county has first-class material.

Mrs. Gould was granted a divorce and was allowed \$36,000 per year alimony. In the trial of the case she claimed that her husband allowed her only \$40,000 a year for dress which was insufficient. How will the poor woman be able to exist now on only \$36,000. Poor, down-trodden woman!

J. E. Marcell, the Highland bank wrecker, has put several Kansas City bankers in the hole for \$125,000 and has fled. Gov. Hoch made a great record in turning criminals loose on society. Hoch is a republican.

Another hot air boom for another Kansas politician has gone up into etherical space. The Washington dispatches last Wednesday tendered Secretary Wilson's resignation from the Agricultural department and appointed Congressman Scott of the second district of this state. Now comes Secretary Wilson and declares his intention of hanging on to the job. "Fame is vapor."

Although the verdict in the famous Calhoun case in San Francisco was decidedly unsatisfactory, being a disagreement after a trial lasting over 5 months, all of the time, money and energy used in prosecution of that case was not lost. The moral effect of the trial, showing that it is not impossible to bring the men higher up in matters of municipal graft to the bar of justice, even if justice does miscarry a bit, will be great, not only in California but in every state in the union. —Topeka Journal.

T. A. McNeal publishes his platform on which he is making the race for congressman against Dan Anthony, in last week's Mail and Breeze. It is democratic throughout and it is suspected that Tom got his pointers from the democratic platform of 1908. Such sentiments uttered by Wm. J. Bryan or J. D. Botkin could get much republican support but coming from McNeal, the republicans of Kansas will come very endorsing it. The party name has come to be a big factor. We hope, however, Tom will win out. We want to see democratic demands win out if they come under a republican brand.
