We have observed by an examination of Mr. Griffin's record, that he has followed Stone's leadership very closely and if Mr. Griffin should be elected we would, of course, be delighted to see him land the best committee assignments. But, after all, we would rather see him do his Stone work as a private citizen.

In his school house speeches he raves and snorts about Seward I Field's owning an automobile and advises people to vote against all county officers who own a car. Yet he was transported to and from these meetings by R. S. Crane who is a candidate for reelection to the office of clerk of the district court, in his automobile, and we understand doesn't pay a cent for his transportation. Now if the argument against Mr. Field is good, it will also apply against Mr. Crane who is a candidate on Glover's ticket. It is hard to tell which he is attacking in his harangue speeches—Field or Crane. Poor old Glover!

The esteemed Salina Journal is certainly jumping around. For four years it sang the praises of Senator Hodges, and told what a fine fellow he was. It told about one time when they had a reception for Senator Quincy, that Quincy in a speech had told how fair a fighter Senator Hodges was, and that although a Democrat he could always be counted upon to vote for the people's interests. Now the same Salina Journal says Hodges is a reactionary. When did he change? Will the Journal please tell what law he voted for that shows he has changed his views? Such procedure can only apply after a preliminary hearing is had and the defendant held for trial, and such things do not occur in misdemeanor cases. The county attorney was compelled to bring this prosecution just as he did, and had no authority whatever to hold the prosecuting witness. It was a case in which the witness broke faith and disregarded his honor. Martin doesn't know the law, that's all.



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TAX LEVY OF BARBER COUNTY, 1910.

The tax rolls of Barber county are now in my possession and I will be ready to receive taxes on and after Nov. 1, 1910. Taxes are due on the 1st day of Nov. A rebate of 2 1/2 per cent. on the whole tax is allowed if paid before Dec. 21. No rebate is allowed unless the whole tax is paid at one time; if not paid before December 21 no rebate is allowed, and a penalty of 5 per cent is added from that date to June 30, 10 per cent. from June 30. The following schedule shows the levy of the various townships, cities and school districts.
