There is occasionally some good news from Washington. Pollock was not appointed Supreme Judge.

Eighty-two of the one hundred and five sheriffs elected in Kansas this year are Democrats. Barber County came within nine of making it eighty-three.

Gov. Stubbs always was a vain man, but his vanity has been increased during the past week. The standpat papers are giving him sole credit for Judge Pollock's failure to land on the Supreme bench.

Ever since it became certain that Champ Clark would be the next Speaker of the House, all doubt about the revision of the rules was removed. There is only one way to overcome czarism and bossism. The voters of most of the states adopted that "way" November 8th.

Aldrich and Taft "standpat" on the proposition that no further tariff legislation is necessary. But the American people decided on November 8th that it needed considerable tinkering. The question is: do Aldrich and Taft know better than the people want than do the people themselves?

The best that can be said for a shipping subsidy is that it provides for the payment of public moneys directly to big private interests on the assumption that the maritime commerce of the United States will increase and that the public will then be able to get the donations back indirectly. But past experiment has proven that once the special interests get hold of the people's money, the people have their own trouble getting it back, either directly or indirectly.

Two Unpopular Appointments

The appointment of Judge Robert W. Archbald of Pennsylvania and Interstate Commerce Commissioner Martin A. Knapp to the federal court of commerce is satisfactory to big interests, particularly.

Archbald, although the president may not have known it, was once upon a time the subject of a scathing arraignment in a decision of the Pennsylvania Supreme court, when an enterprise floated by him was denounced as a "fraud upon the public" and a "disregard of the requirements of business honesty."

The suit was one brought in 1885 by Hill, Kelsor & Co., in the Lackawanna county court against Archbald and others, doing business as the Amity Coal Co., Limited. The suit was carried to the state Supreme court. The decision against Archbald was written by the late Justice Williams. It declares that the concern in which Archbald was one of four persons was an "empty shell" and its business, conducted on a fake capital of \$25,000, a "fraud upon the public."

The nomination of Commissioner Knapp is objected to on the ground that Knapp has shown himself to be strongly in favor of railroad privileges, and therefore is disqualified for service on a court which is to pass upon railroad questions.

Close observers at the Capitol declare there is nothing surprising about the appointments. The two nominees are of the same temperament as the men who are most frequently received at the White House, to-wit: Aldrich, Hale, Stephenson, Guggenheim, Penrose. From the first, the President's advisers have been men whose views were not the views of the great mass of the American people. Republicans like LaFollette who have called at the White House to counsel with the President have been kept waiting in the ante-room so long that they have left the executive mansion in disgust.

Since the President has relied upon the suggestion and advice of men unpopular with the people, and has rejected the advice and counsel of Republicans popular with the people, the President should not be surprised that his administration is failing to please the people.

Paid to Run for Governor

S. M. Stallard, the Socialist nominee for governor, is the only candidate for governor, who has filed a list of his expenses for the election and this account is unique in Kansas political affairs. Stallard not only did not spend any of his own money but showed a surplus of about \$100. In his letter to the secretary of state, Mr. Stallard says the Socialists consider candidates as servants of the party. The date-making is done through the state headquarters and his expenses are paid by the state association. The local Socialists pay for the hall and lights and then if they are financially able they pay the candidate \$3 a day for his speeches. Stallard had all his expenses paid and made enough speeches for which he received \$3 to earn fairly good wages for the time spent in the campaign.

The Jubilee Movement

Fifty years ago was organized the first Woman's Mission Board and this year brings the Jubilee anniversary of Woman's organized work for missions. Great things have been accomplished during the past fifty years and the Christian women of America propose to make much of this anniversary.

A great union movement has been inaugurated among the women of all evangelical denominations and a series of conventions reaching the large cities from San Francisco to New England are in progress, to culminate in a great mass convention in the city of New York in May. This is proving to be the same mighty influence among the Christian women of America as was the Laymen's campaign last year for the brotherhood.

The Christian Woman's Board of Missions has undertaken to hold ten sub-rallies in Kansas and one of these will be held in this section. All who are interested in the progress of missionary enterprises should watch for announcements of these rallies. Speakers of national reputation will assist on the program. All who can possibly do so should plan to attend this unique and significant gathering.


